SHOCKING DEATHS.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Albany, N. Y., May 27.—Electric cars racing for a switch while running in opposite directions at the rate of 40 miles an hour, cost five lives yesterday afternoon by terrific collision, while over 40 prominent people, some fatally and others seriously injured, fill the accident wards of the various hospitals, with the possibility of other deaths.

New Glasgow, N. S., May 27.—Henry McGregor, of this town, was killed in the railway yard on Saturday night. He was struck by a locomotive and met instant death. He was 45 years of age and a shipping clerk in the employ of the Nova Scotia Steel Company's works at Trenton. A widow and two children survive.

IMPORTANT JUDGMENT.

Washington, May 27.—The World states the decision of the United States supreme court in the insular cases, which will probably be handed down today, will say that the constitution does not follow the flag.

This important ruling means that all states except the original thirteen, have been illegally admitted to statehood, that the Philippines and Porto Rico are "war territory" and it is within the power of Congress to relinquish American control of them.

BURT'S CORNER.

Mr. T. L. Griffiths, one of our most aged farmers, in relating some of his experiences on sheep raising, says that all farmers, who keep a flock of sheep, should make it their aim to have a pet lamb in the flock, as it has a strong tendency to tame the rest of them; he says that he has on several occasions tried this experiment and is well pleased with the result.

Mr. Griffiths in relating a hawk story to the Herald reporter, says that many years ago while residing at his old home on the banks of the Keswick stream, he frequently during the summer months watched the movements of a large fish hawk perching on a big pine tree, which overhung the banks of the stream near the house, which was daily on the alert for a meal of the finny tribe. Mr. Griffiths says he observed this bird was very successful in catching fish, and although he himself often went to the bank of the stream to see if he could get sight of these schools of fish, this bird fed on, he never was successful in his venture. This aroused his curiosity still the more and one day the hawk after diving into the stream and fetching out a fish, somehow when it raised from over the stream and while making preparations to eat it, let it drop to the ground. Mr Griffiths found the fish to be a large sucker, after learning this, he determined to what depth the bird dived to secure it. He says the stream at this special place was fully 20 feet measured by a pole. The sucker being a fish which invariably clings to the muddy bottom would necessitate the hawk going clear to the bed of the stream before catching it; to the ordinary person this story would seem incredible, but any person having acquaintance of our friend Mr Griffiths can rely fully on this being authentic.

Tarte makes Changes.

Ottawa, May 27.—A number of changes have taken place in staff of the department of public works. Hon J I Tarte has promoted the secretary of the department, Mr J R Roy, to be inspector of public works all over the dominion. YORK COUNTY MAN

Drowned on the Drive in Aroostook River.

BELONGED TO HOWLAND RIDGE AND WAS MUCH ESTEEMED.

Nobody saw Him Sink to His Death.

A sad drowning accident happened on Thursday last on the Aroostook river where Edward Hill of Howland Ridge, near Millville, York Co., a son of Wm. Hill, lost his life.

Just how the accident occurred no one seems to know. The young man was river driving for John R McConnell, a large operator on Aroostook waters. He had been working for some time, was well liked by his companions and was a good lad at his task. The accident happened at what is known as the Giberson Gut, above Little Moose Lake. He was stationed on a turn. It is supposed he tried to cross the Gut on a log, but he was alone and no one saw him go under. His cries were heard. Men hurried to the spot whence the cry came, but could find no trace of the young man. His peevy was found near by. At first search was unsuccessful. Next day Wm. McGuire, the boss of the crew, and Donell Donohue, went to the spot in a canoe, and after some searching found the body in a bit of dead water about ten feet deep. The body was brought to Houlton by Mr Donohue, who also accompanied it to Woodstock, where it was met by an uncle, Samuel Hill. The remains were taken to his late home via Millville on Saturday. Every one speaks in high terms of the unfortunate young man. He was 23 years of age.
