KILLED ON THE RAIL.

Feared That Victim of Accident is a York County Man.

F. A. McGivney, a Boston & Maine brakeman, fell between the engine and car on a special freight train, near the Willey House, in the White Mountains, Saturday night, and was killed. The entire train passed over him and his body was cut in pieces. McGivney was not missed by his train mates and the body remained on the tracks until next forenoon, when it was found by a section man. McGivney was 30 years old and a native of New Brunswick, where his parents live. He was to have been married to a New Brunswick young lady early next month.—Press deepatch.

[Mrs. James Doohan of this city, has a brother named T. A. McGivney, working as brakeman on the road mentioned above, and it is feared that it is he who has been killed. T. A. McGivney is a son of Daniel McGivney of Magundy, York Co., and is about 27 years of age.]

THE SONS OF ENGLAND

Had Their Annual Church Service Yesterday—Appropriate Sermon by Canon Roberts.

The Sons of England to the number of about sixty, met at their hall yesterday afternoon and headed by the 71st Regiment Band, marched to St Ann's church where a special anniversary service was held. Rev Canon Roberts preached an appropriate sermon to a large congregation. The church was tastily decorated for the occasion with flags and bunting. At the close of the service the procession reformed and returned to their hall by way of Westmorland, Queen, St John and Brunswick street, the band playing a lively quickstep.

The Police Court.

Four Saturday night drunks made a deposit of \$4 each at the police court this morning. One Sunday offender paid the usual \$8 fine. An Indian named Louis Sockolocksis charged with dealing out liquor to brother Indians was remanded until tomorrow.

The young man from St John, who was arrested on the 24th for assault was fined \$10 or two months jail. The fine was allowed to stand.

The Hewitson Case.

The new enquiry into the death of the late Col. Hewitson, which was ordered by the attorney general, will take place before Coroner F. J. Seery, tomorrow, beginning at eleven o'clock. A new jury is being summoned today. The witnesses include Newton Lee, John Johnston, Annie Black, Oscar Peters, Chas Wright, Silas McIntyre, Wellington Gerow and Mrs Hewitson. G. W. Allen, K. C., will watch the inquest in behalf of the crown.

Dr Colter Improved.

Hon. Geo. J. Colter and T. H. Colter returned this morning from St John, where they spent Sunday with their brother Post Office Inspector Colter, who was injured in the recent railway accident on the Elgin branch railway. They found Dr Colter very much improved and he will be able to move around again after a short rest.

STUDENTS' SERVICE.

Rev. G. M. Campbell Preached a Special Sermon at the Methodist Church.

As yesterday was the last Sunday which the University students will spend in the city for some time, a special service for them was held at the Methodist church last evening. A large number of the students, wearing the cap and gown, were present and Rev. G. M. Campbell preached an eloquent and appropriate sermon, giving the students some sound advice.

In pews reserved for them were seated Chancellor Harrison and several of the Professors and about sixty of the students.

Mr. Campbell selected for his text 1 John II 14. "I have written unto you young man, because ye are strong, and the word of God abideth in you." He said there is no place for the coward in the strife met with in every day life. The battle is to the strong and the weaklings are pushed aside. In every direction the call for strong young men may be heard. The various professions and industrial enterprises need men of pluck and daring, and to the youth of the country the call comes with unmistakable force. Perhaps the chief obstacle to success in many instances is the fact that young men are continually met with who are patiently waiting for something to turn up. The preacher urged the young men and women of the first graduating class of the twentieth century to make a place in the world for themselves; don't wait for anybody, carve your own way. He first urged the young people with the world ahead of them to have faith in their own ability; faith in self which does not indicate unbelief in God. Instances of personal faith in self were portrayed in the lives of Moses, of Isaiah, of Aristotle, of Plato, and of distinguished lives reaching down to our own day.

Next, the preacher would have young men have faith in others. Honor all men and do no measure them by the bad that is in them. It is most unfair to measure the standard of the press of our country by one unprincipled publication; or to lose confidence in the legal profession because one member goes astray; to judge the pulpit by the man who has proved untrue to his high calling or to judge marriage by divorce. Have faith in righteousness—he that doeth righteousness is righteous. In the latter of life to which the young people were soon to engage he assured them that there are some things they cannot learn by skill or energy, for they can only be disclosed by sorrow and suffering. In closing the preacher's parting words to the students of the University and other educational institutions were earnest and encouraging and all were urged to have faith in Christ.

During the service excellent music was rendered by the choir, and solos by Miss Nan Thompson and Mr Winters were much appreciated.

New Street Lights.

The light committee of the city council have decided to place three new street lamps, one on Brunswick street in front of St Dunstan's church, one on Saunders street and one on Queen square. The lights are much needed in all the places named, and as it was agreed at the first of the year to have them placed no time should be lost in doing so.
