NOTES OF THE NEWS.

Interesting Occurrences Paragraphed for Herald Readers

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

Salvis Janero, a Mexican toreador, engaged in the bull fight at South Omaha, was recently tossed by an infuriated bull about 40 feet. His injuries are not serious.

Two well known Russian banks are reported to be in the last extremities, their paper being quoted at a third of its nominal value. Should these banks fail many commercial houses will go under.

The will of John J. Lawlor, Toronto, Lieutenant in the 6th Inniskillen Dragoons, who was killed at Waterford, South Africa, last August, has been filed for probate. He left an estate of \$101,707, half of which goes to his mother and half to his sister.

The big expenditure at Old Orchard for buildings to accommodate the New England Fair, goes for naught as Manager M. F. Porter has at last decided that there will be no fair at Old Orchard this year. This decision settles the question of a great fair in the western portion of the state.

A famous bee story comes from Newburgh village. Roscoe Harding, of that town is the fourth generation of his family who now reside on the same place that members of his family have occupied for 101 years. During all that time the Hardings have kept bees and have never lost a swarm.

On the 25th inst. the new battleship Maine will be launched at Cramp's shipyard, near Philadelphia, and she will be christened by Miss Sigsbee, daughter of Capt. Charles D. Sigsbee, commander of the ill-fated Maine, when she was blown up in Havana harbor. The honor of christening a battleship is much coveted, and in this case it could not be better bestowed than upon the daughter of Commander Sigsbee.

The Manitoba government office announces that that province this season will need twelve thousand men from the outside to gather in the bountiful harvest. The largest number ever required before was ten thousand in 1899, when an exceptionally fine crop was harvested. A larger crop this year requires the additional help. The movement to the west will begin about the first of August.

Steamship men, both foreign and coastwise report that this is the most prosperous season they have had for years. Not only are the big ocean liners enjoying unusual prosperity, but the down east lines, the International, Dominion, Atlantic, Plant boats are also having plenty of business. The summer season has set in full; and with well appointed ships fitted especially for this service, excursionists have ample transportation facilities.

From August 17th to 24th the New Hampshire people will celebrate their third annual Old Home week. The week will begin with beacon fires on the hills. There will be sermons appropriate to the occasion on the Sunday, and then the remainder of the time will be passed according to the individual preference of the visitors and their friends. Governor Rollins in whose brain the happy idea of the Old Home week first had inception, issues the invitation for this year, and asks that the thousands that come last year will return again this year.

An Ottawa despatch says the new program of the D. R. R. in the regulations for the Bisley team for 1902, after the ordinary mode of selection has been dealt with, gives the following: It is, however, to be understood that the sending of a team to England in 1902 is dependent upon the action taken by the National Rifle Association with regard to their matches of that year and the state of the funds of the Dominion Rifle Association. By decision of council, no competitor shall be eligible for selection as a member of the Bisley team who has been on the team twice or oftener during the previous four years. No one who has twice been a member of the team in the years 1898, 1899, 1900, 1901 will be eligible for selection.

A Chicagoan with music in his soul has lately invented a musical bicycle, which will no doubt soothe the savage breasts of many enemies of the vehicle hitherto rushing so silently on its unwary victims. The instrument is simple enough—a number of piano wires stretched across a frame, and a crossbar with hammers lifted by pins on a revolving cylinder. Rope gear connecting wheel and cylinder rotates the latter. And so it happens that the swifter the wheel of progress the more music will there be in the air.

A report from Mr. Harding who conducted the preliminary enquiry into the stranding of the Steamer Armen a near the entrance to St. John harbor, was received at Ottawa on Thursday. The court does not consider that the captain should be censured as his navigation of the ship appears to have been carefully attended to. It was considered, however, that the captain was guilty of an error in judgment in not keeping in deep water till the pilot came aboard, or till the weather cleared.

The evidence adduced showed that the children of James Dunn are actually half brothers-in-law of their mother, the peculiar relationship having been brought about in this way: James Dunn, jr., was killed by lightning, and his father, James Dunn, married his widow, and became the stepfather of five children. As the result of the latter union more children were born. Consequently the children of James Dunn are half brothers and at the same time, uncles of the children of James Dunn, Jr., while their stepfather is also their grandfather.
