Raising sectarian feelings is a very small business for a minister of the gospel.

The approach of the Royal party to the Canadian shores is likely to be marked by a great naval display, consisting of eighteen or twenty warships of the British, French and American navies.

The Canadian recruits sent to the Baden-Powell constabulary in South Africa, must have been of excellent physique. Of the 1200 men only two have been discharged as medically unfit for duty.

Chatham, Newcastle, Halifax, Campbellton, St. John and other maritime cities and towns are preparing for the Minto reception. What is being done in Fredericton. The vice regal party will be here July 30.

The women of the Liberal party in England are credited with getting the disagreeing leaders together and patching up a kind of truce. What a field there is in this direction for the women of another party nearer home.

The Liberal government has a majority in Parliament from every province in Canada except Ontario, and when Mr. McLeod stated in his Burt's Corner address that the government is kept in power by Quebec, he attempted to deceive the people.

China is sending a special envoy to Germany to apologize for the murder of the German minister, Von Kettler, but it will be poor reparation to the murdered minister's widow, an American lady, who was with her husband at Pekin when the crime was committed.

Mr. Monk, M. P. is telling the Quebec people what a great success the recent Conservative picnic at Halifax was. The same gentlemen when on his stumping tour here last Autumn, declared that Quebec would divide pretty nearly even between Grits and Tories. Mr. Monk is not a safe political prophet. The Halifax picnic was no more of a success than was the Tory campaign in Quebec. Mr. Monk, in the vernacular of the street is a gentleman who talks through his hat.

The Halifax Herald, with the dignity that becomes a leading newspaper, declares that the Jews of Our Saviour's day were a more respectable and honorable body than "Tarte and his gang at Ottawa." The same paper is also pleased to observe that the Grits of Nova Scotia in the last Dominion election returned to Parliament "a number of characters of the yellow dog variety." Such elevated and polished estimates of its political opponents are most creditable to a journal with the high aspirations and lofty tone of the Halifax Herald.

Dr. Fiske the celebrated historian recently dead, at the age of 59 once issued a defiance to the health authorities, declaring "I always sit in a draught when I find one; wear the thinnest clothes I can find winter and summer; catch cold once in three or four years, but not severely, and prefer to work in a cold room, 55 to 60 degrees. Work the larger part of each 24 hours, and by day or night indifferently. Scarcely ever change a word once written; eat when hungry; rarely ever taste coffee or wine or smoke a cigar, but drink two or three quarts of beer each day and smoke a pipe all the time when at work." Dr. Fiske died of exhaustion from heat.

In the case of Mr Foster and Addington, it looks as if Barkie is willing but the other fellow is not. Mr Foster's friends have sent out the report that he could have the nomination in Addington if he wanted it, but Mr Foster told the Toronto Globe, on Thursday, that no such offer had been made to him, and Mr Taylor said to the same paper, that while Mr Foster was considering the question, the constituency itself would have something to say about it. Mr Foster also suggested to the Globe that it might treat the matter as a midsummer joke, all of which would seem to indicate that the ex finance minister is not likely to tackle Addington.

The speeches by leading Orangemen at Moncton, Friday, seem to have been marked by good judgment, calmness and reason. Nothing apparently was said of a nature to arouse sectarian animosity, but at Burt's corner in this county Mr McLeod evidently chose the occasion for opening his political campaign. It is a great pity that an attempt should be made to mix the order up with politics. Mr. T. H. Colter, ex-M. P. P., who was present at the Burt's Corner gathering and who followed Mr McLeod, seems to have given an effective answer to Mr. McLeod's political observations.

The Moncton Transcript says that in that city Friday during the Orange celebration, there was no bitterness, and that Catholic merchants "vied with each other in paying a tribute of decoration to their Orange brethren." The Transcript adds that "it was a most unique incident, and most creditable to the city; one that will be long remembered as indicating the true spirit of civil and religious liberty and charity."

The gossips say that Lord Rosebery and the Duchess of Albany, sister-in-law to King Edward, are to be married shortly, and that this was the cause of the noble Lord's recent interview with His Sovereign. The Duchess is the widow of Prince Leopold, and before her marriage with him was Princess Helene, of Waldeck.

CANADA EASTERN

The Road Being Improved
In all Its Departments

COMPANY IS DETERMINED TO
REACH A HIGH STANDARD.

A Rumor that the C. P. R. is
Seeking to Acquire the Line.

(Miramichi Advance.)

The management of the Canada Eastern railway has expended a good deal of money this season in improving the road in all its departments. Those who had passed over it a year ago and have again done so recently cannot fail to realize the difference in its condition. New sleepers and ballasting appear to have been put in wherever needed to even up the rails and make the road bed true and firm. The passenger cars are very comfortable and only excelled by those of the I. C. R. and C. P. R. trunk lines. The station buildings along the line are receiving attention from carpenters and painters, and the whole road gives evidence of a determination on the part of the company to keep it up to a satisfactory standard.

A year or two ago it seems as if this important line—second in the volume of its traffic only to the main lines of the Intercolonial and Canadian Pacific, with both of which it connects—had been allowed to deteriorate. There was a pretty well-grounded opinion that as both the C. P. R. and Government were desirous of acquiring it, the management was retaining much of the proportion of its surplus earnings which should have been expended in maintenance of the road-bed and rolling-stock. It is now evident that, whatever may be the status of negotiations in regard to the proposed change of ownership, the Gibson Company has applied itself in a very enterprising way to putting the road in a condition satisfactory to the travelling public.

There are rumors that the C. P. R., has been renewing its efforts to acquire the line, the Dominion Government having shown a most unusual tardiness in taking advantage of the opportunity it was supposed to have had a year or two ago to make it a part of the I. C. R. system and thus have access to the centre of the province and an all round rail and water connection with St. John via Fredericton. People of the North Shore and St. John river counties are yet very desirous of seeing this scheme accomplished. In the meantime they realise that the Company's enterprise in placing the Canada Eastern in its present condition of efficiency, is an additional claim upon their appreciation and loyal support in a business way.
