FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

Toronto retail butchers have drawn up a blacklist of bad debtors.

While getting off the train at Atherley, Ont., on his way home from conference in Toronto, Rev John Lawrence of Rama fell and broke his leg above the knee.

The steamer Mohawk, in carrying passengers from New York to Glen Island, struck a rock just off New Rochelle, with 900 passengers on board, and sank in less than twenty minutes. All the passengers were saved.

The whisky output of Kentucky is to be 25,000,000 gallons this year. Even the \$25,000,000 output from the Klondike wouldn't buy it. There will be enough to give a third of a gallon to every man, woman and child in the United States.

Alexander J MacInnes of Middle River, Victoria Co., Cape Breton, is a giant. He is only 15 years old yet he stands 6ft 7 in in height, and weighs 208 lbs. He is deep breasted, broad shouldered, with strength written in every line of his well proportioned body.

A despatch received at the war office from Gen Kitchener states that since June 24 the various British columns in South Africa report: Boers killed, 74; Boers wounded, 66; Boers captured, 160; Boers surrounded, 136; rifles captured, 131; rounds ammunition, 15,800; wagons, 304.

Joseph Ladue, the founder of Dawson City, Klondike, is dead at his home in Schuylar Falls, New York. Mr Ladue had not been well since his return from Alaska and spent last winter at Colorado Springs in a vain search for health. He finally fell a victim to consumption contracted in the severe northern climate.

The civic committee of Toronto making preparations for the reception of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, have reported in favor of providing accommodation for choirs of 2,000 adults and 20,000 school children, stands for the latter to be erected opposite Government House. The cost of the city reception will be \$10,000, and the music programme will be the chief feature.

Judging from the English newspapers, says the Halifax Chronicle, Mr W A Hickman, New Brunswick's capable and energetic immigration agent in the Old Country, seems to be making a great success of advertising that province. He has made New Brunswick known as never before to the people of Great Britain. Much good is sure to come of his efforts. Might it not pay Nova Scotia to have a similar representative engaged in a like work?

The Canadian exhibit at the Glasgow Exposition is evidently a credit to the Dominion. It is said to be the objective point of most visitors on reaching the grounds, and the British journalists appear to vie with each other as to which can speak most kindly of the exhibit. The London Times says that the Canadian Agricultural Trophy is worth the expense and time of a trip from London, if for no other object than to see it. The Canadian department of agriculture has evidently done its work thoroughly.

The 930 Boer prisoners who arrived at Hamilton, Bermuda, June 28 on the British transport Armenian have been moved into the camps prepared for them on Darrell and Tucker's Islands. These Boers were part of Cronje's army and were captured at Paardeberg. They include several boys of 8 and 10 years old, who carried ammunition to their fathers when the latter were in the Boer trenches. Among the prisoners were also two Boers so old they crawled on all fours down the transport's gangway. These two old men aver they never saw salt water before reaching Cape Town.

The steamer Victorian arrived at Seattle, Monday. She carried \$600,000 in dust from the Bank of Commerce at Dawson, also \$200,000 private. Agish Charlie, an Indian, brother-in-law of McCormick, the discoverer of the Klondike, is on board, bringing \$150,000. The clean-up of three discovery claims in the Bonanza owned by himself and his brother, Tagish

Jim. All time records were broken last week by the new Yukon River boats, Dawson and Selkirk. The trip from Dawson to White Horse was made in sixty-eight hours. Passengers made immediate connection with the Victorian at Skagway and reached Seattle seven and a half days from Dawson.

The Canadian financial year of 1900-1901 just closed, shows the largest customs receipts in the history of the Dominion. Exclusive of the Yukon and the Coast, from which returns have not yet been received, the customs revenue for the year is \$28,990,254. This is an increase of \$81,236 over last year, and this increase will be \$200,000 when all the returns are in. In 1896 the customs revenue was \$20,000,000. The returns for June shows receipts were \$148,464 more than in June of last year.
