

STIRRING ADDRESSES

At the Church of England
Missionary Meeting.

REV. MR. HASLAM GOING TO
WORK IN INDIA.

The Church's Duty Clearly Put
Forward.

The annual missionary meeting of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England, was held at the Church Hall Thursday evening and a fairly large audience was present.

Dean Partridge presided in the absence of His Lordship Bishop Kingston.

After the opening hymn and prayers, led by Archdeacon Neales of Woodstock, the Dean delivered a short address, explaining the objects of the society.

Canon Forsythe chairman of the Domestic and Foreign societies read the report of that society. The report dealt with the work of this missionary society in the west and of the work which it hoped to perform in China, Africa and other foreign lands. The report was carefully prepared and shows the society to be in a healthy condition and progressing favorably.

Rev Mr Haslam curate of the Stone church St. John, moved a resolution expressing thanks for the success of the work of missions during the Nineteenth century, and expressing the hope that all church men would help God's work in the missions. In moving the resolution Mr. Haslam made an eloquent address dealing with the work and spirit of foreign missions. The spirit of foreign missions furnishes congregations with an outlet for their spiritual energies. The church which went into the missionary work today, is the flourishing church. The church of Rome was the most perfectly organized church in the world today, but the Church of England was more: she was a living and a moving church. The work was of vital interest to every member of the church of Christ.

It was all right to follow Jesus Christ through self interest and for fear of future punishment, but the broad spirit of Christianity was that which makes us think of the spiritual welfare of our fellow man. Mr Haslam pointed to the great possibilities in missionary work at the present day and of the great open door for missionaries in all parts of the world.

Mr Haslam said that before this time next year he hoped to be in India doing missionary work. He pointed out the great work to be done in that country, especially by young women. China, Africa and South America were also mentioned as great fields for labor. We need a deeper spirituality in the Church and in the ministry. We want more prayer in the churches. We need more men in the foreign field. We need more money. If we touch more hearts in the missionary work the money will come.

W M Jarvis, seconded the resolution with an address dealing with the foreign branch of the work and the history of church missionary societies. Mr. Jarvis paid a compliment to Rev. Mr. Haslam, and said that the parishioners of the Stone church, while congratulating him on his missionary spirit, would bear of his departure with deep regret.

Rev J A Richardson, of Trinity church, St John, was next introduced, and discussed the subject of Canadian Domestic missions in a most eloquent address. He thought that there was as great a field of work in the home-land of the great west of Canada as in the dark plains of the east. The work was important in Canada where we were building up a church. If the church of England does not push into the west today, in a few years it will be conspicuous by its absence. The Presbyterian church is taking the lead there.

Canada is marching onward and pushing into the great west and the sons and daughters of the church should labor to see that commerce does not out-run Christianity.

Hon J P Burchill, M P P, who followed Mr Richardson, also spoke on the missionary work in the Canadian west. He showed the need of emigrants in the west, first dealing with their temporal wants which, he showed would be easily supplied by the governments and otherwise. But the spiritual wants would be harder to supply. Laymen here in New Brunswick who were used to having all the church services supplied each Sunday, failed to realize the urgent needs of those new settlers and others in the west. Each member of the Church of England

in Canada has a duty to perform in this matter, and he hoped they would attend to it.

The meeting closed with an appropriate hymn by the congregation.
