She was a daughter of Mr and Mrs Jas Arnold, and her sister was buried July 3rd. She leaves a husband and three children to mourn their loss. Funeral on Saturday at two o'clock. Interment to take place at Free Baptist Cemetery. R. B. Adams has charge of the funeral.

Kings' Daughters' Convention.

Miss Neill, Miss Cooper, Miss Florence Whitehead, Miss Thorne, Miss Wiley and Miss Sadie Sterling are the representatives from Fredericton at the King's Daughters' Convention now sitting at St. John. At Thursday afternoon's session Miss Thorne read a most interesting paper on the Power of Individual Life. It was listened to throughout with the deepest interest and at the close Miss Thorne was tendered a hearty vote of thanks.

Teacher and Pupil.

Two of Fredericton's grand old men, Hon Senator Wark aged 97, and ex Judge Hon James Steadman, aged 83, have sustained close friendly relations during their long lives. At Moncton many years ago, Mr Steadman attended school taught by Senator Wark, and at one time they were members of the same local government. It is not told whether teacher

Wark found it necessary to birch pupil Steadman, but it is probable that in those days of corporal punishment the future Senator found it necessary to use the rod on the future postmaster general and judge, else the latter would not have grown up such a good boy.

THE EXHIBITION.

Work on the New Building Progressing Favorably.

Contractor Scarr has a large force of men at work on the new exhibition building, and expects to have the frame up in the course of a few days. Members of the building committee visited the grounds this morning and expressed themselves as well satisfied with the progress being made.

The executive have sent out printed circulars to every agricultural society in the province, inviting their co-operation, and expressing the hope that they will use every effort to induce the agriculturists in their respective localities to send exhibits.

The printing committee have procured ten thousand printed envelopes, containing an advertisement of the exhibition, and are distributing them among the business men of the city.

A Good Suggestion.

A number of citizens who take a great interest in the work of beautifying the city, have made a suggestion to the military authorities which if acted upon would result in a decided improvement to one part of Queen street. The suggestion is that the military authorities take down the present rather unsightly high board fence on the Queen street side of the soldiers barracks, move in the gateway in line with the building, and fence in the space from the upper corner of the building to the Normal school lot. The grass plot on the Queen street side would then be exposed and with little effort could be made quite attractive. It is understood that the matter has been referred to the authorities at Ottawa.

Valuable Estate.

The estate of the late Mrs Z. Chipman of St. Stephen is entered in the probate court at \$24,200 personal, and \$5,500 real estate. John D. Chipman is executor and Lady Tilly executrix. By the terms of the will, the sum of \$250 is given to the Methodist Church; in St. Stephen; the shares of stock held by the deceased in the W. C. T. U. building in St. Stephen are given to that society; numerous personal friends and the grand children and other relatives of the deceased lady are remembered by small specific bequests, and the balance of the estate, when converted into cash, is to be equally divided among the four children of Mrs. Chipman, who survive her, viz: Lady Tilley, Mrs. Toller, Mrs. Howland and J. D. Chipman.

Had Poor Luck.

William F. Warton, and son, W. P. Warton, returned this afternoon from a fortnight's fishing trip on the Southwest Miramichi. They had only indifferent success, and claim that the river has been depleted of salmon by poachers who abound in that vicinity. They took dinner at the Barker house and returned home by the western train. The Messrs. Warton have whipped the Miramichi waters for several years now, but it is hardly likely, judging from the tone of their conversation, that they will do so again.

A VALUABLE GIFT.

Hon A. F. Randolph Will Donate an Ambulance to Victoria Hospital.

MR. JOHN A. EDWARDS WILL STORE HORSE AND MAN IT.

The Addition Being Built to the Hospital

The numerous friends of Hon. A. F. Randolph and citizens generally will be glad to know that his health is steadily improving, and that he is now able to take daily exercise in the open air. For the first time in many months he attended a meeting of the Victoria Hospital Trustees this week, and occupied the chair. His appearance at the meeting was a pleasant surprise to his brother trustees and they gave him a most cordial and hearty welcome. After the routine business of the meeting had been transacted, Mr. Randolph treated the trustees to a further surprise by announcing that he had made up his mind to donate an ambulance wagon to the institution, providing his doing so would not interfere with any arrangements for procuring one already made by the trustees. Of course the very generous offer was promptly accepted and several of the trustees took occasion to return thanks to the honorable gentleman, and to refer in kindly terms to his generosity and the philanthropic interest he had always taken in the welfare of the institution.

It may be added here that the need of an ambulance for the hospital has long been felt, and that Mr. Randolph has disposed of a question that has been agitating the trustees and other friends of the institution for many months. Some time ago Proprietor Edwards of the Queen hotel informed members of the Hospital Aid Society that if an ambulance was procured he would allow it to be kept at his stables, and would supply men and horses to handle it free of charge, and this offer still holds good. The cost of an ambulance will be between three and five hundred dollars.

The trustees some time ago decided to build an addition to the hospital, and when the work is completed four additional rooms will be provided for the use of patients. William Minne, of Gibson, is the contractor for the work.
