The last will and testament of the late Mrs. Julius L. Inches was probated today. The estate is sworn at \$30,000 and deducting mortgages and other debts is valued at \$13,500. The executors are Frank I. Morrison and Dr. P. R. Inches, E. Byron Winslow, proctor.

The will provides that testator's sister Mrs. Isabel Stewart shall have the use of all the estate during her lifetime and at her death it is to be apportioned as follows:

To Frank I. Morrison, testator's nephew, the brick residence, furnishings, horses, carriages, etc., corner of Queen and St. John streets.

To Dr. P. R. Inches, St. John, \$4,000.

To Walter W. Inches, St. Stephen, \$500.

To Thos E. Morrison of New York, \$1,000.

To Julius I. Morrison of Kansas city, \$500.

To Stewart L. Morrison of Fredericton, \$500.

To Frank I. Everett of San Francisco, \$500.

To Stewart Everett of Moncton \$500.

Mrs. Coffee, Moncton, \$500.

To Mrs. McGrath, St. John, \$500.

To George Everett and William Everett, of the United States, \$200 each.

The residue of the estate, if any, goes to Frank I. Morrison.

are tastily laid out, being divided in lots. The owners being very fond of game and the beasts of the forest, have secured many specimens of the black bear, elk, red deer, moose and caribou, which are securely fenced in and can be seen by the pleasure seeker roaming about at their leisure where they appear quite happy. Brain of course being chained securely to his post and is supplied with his domicile which he guards with great diligence. So the Clergues and their happy family live together in union.

The town council here are a smart set of businessmen. They are this summer spending over \$65,000 on the sewers and are having a good map of the town made, and are forming plans for a city of 30,000 inhabitants in five or six years time. Buildings are simply jumping up here and every storekeeper reports trade A. 1. There has been all along this summer they say a tremendous transient trade. This is at present quite a rough community owing to so many strangers coming and going, and not a few criminals make this the American Soo a centre.

Typhoid fever is rather prevalent, but the town council have taken measures to have the water works pipes changed to where better water can be procured. There is a good lot of churches here and the clergy of all denominations are very energetic in their work. A stranger will be well used by them if he makes himself known. They are a fine set of men and good most result from their labors.

This is the only spot in the great lakes where a railroad or other bridge can be built to connect the roads leading backward and through from U. S. A., and Canada. The Clergue syndicate are laying out plans to build right across the street from where I was boarding. The largest flour mill in the world, also a big glass mill, and sulphite mills of which I make mention are gigantic, they are capable of manufacturing toilet, writing and fine note paper. The pulp mills are run by nothing but water turbines, no steam whatever. The syndicate will in a short time start the manufacture of flat and box cars, also all kinds of railway coaches. The foundries here use exclusively electric cranes for moving heavy material, and have a dipper for pouring purposes with a capacity of holding ten tons of melted iron. The blacksmith shops are wonders. The men employed in them turn out magnificent work.

The pulp mills have a contract from German firms which will take one year to fill, requiring them to work steadily

day and night. In connection with the pulp mills there is the Alkatic works, which make bleaching powder from Brine (salt and water). Mr. McLellan, son of the late David McLellan, of St. John has been awarded a large contract to supply the company with pulp wood, and I learn that he is trying to get hundreds of New Brunswick men to come up this way to cut it.

New Brunswick is well represented in the Soo. W. Z. Earle of St. John, with head office here, is chief engineer of the Algoma Central Ry.; his assistant engineer is Mr. McCarthy of Moncton, Charles Kinear of St. John is assistant paymaster and here and there one will find our province men in some of the best positions. The western folks welcome an easterner as they claim they are very reliable.

The Clergue syndicate are now exploring Hudson Bay in quest of a good port which they will need when they extend the Algoma central and Hudson Bay railway to its waters. The country here and the bay is to be well explored and opened up from Hudson Bay, they will ship their products to Europe.

—TO—

Water Consumers.

The attention of water consumers is called to section 12 of the Water Bye Laws as follows:

12. Persons removing from any premises who have paid toll rates in advance, will be entitled to an allowance for the time unexpired, provided written notice is given at the Superintendent's Office at the time of such removal.

Persons wishing to discontinue the use of water must give written notice thereof at the Office previous to the expiration of the time for which payment has been made, otherwise they will be liable for the rent for the ensuing six months.

Owing to the increasing tendency of water consumers to ignore the above Bye Law, it will be strictly enforced in future.
