

Major-General Dartnell, K.C.B.

Major-General Dartnell, who has received a K. C. B. for his services in South Africa, was born in London, Ont., 1838. He is the son of the late Dr. Geo. Russell Dartnell, Deputy Inspector-General of Army Hospitals and formerly surgeon of the 1st Royals. General Dartnell entered the army as ensign in the 86th Regiment in 1855 and was subsequently Adjutant of the force, serving with it in the Central India force during the mutiny. He was present at the storm and capture of Chundaree, and led the only successful attack on the fortress of Jhansi, was severely wounded and mentioned in despatches, and received a brevet majority. Subsequently he served in the Bhootan expedition as A. D. C. to Major-General Tombs. General Dartnell retired from the army in 1864, and in 1874 became Major commanding the Natal Volunteers and Mounted Police forces, a position he has held ever since. In 1879 he led the left flanking force of Lord Chelmsford's column from Isanahlwana in the Zulu war, and is mentioned by name in Mr. Rider Haggard's novel, "The Witch's Head." In 1881 he received the decoration of a C. M. G. General Dartnell has most recently been in command of a column operating in the Eastern Transvaal under General French, his services having been "loaned" to the Imperial authorities by the Natal Government.

The Frog Visitation.

Sergt. Richardson, V.C.

Sergt. Richardson, V. C., who was the first to receive at the hands of King Edward, was a member of the Strathcona Horse, and lives in the Northwest. He has arrived home in Canada. The deed for which the cross was given was performed at Wolverspruit on the 5th of July, 1900. On that occasion he was engaged with his regiment in an attack on the Boers who were then occupying an ambushed position. When they opened fire at close range, the order was given to retire, but Sergt. Richardson wished to unload his magazine before complying with the order, and continued to fire away. When the magazine was empty he turned to rejoin the rest of the troop, who were making for a kopje in the distance. On rising from the ground he noticed a fellow trooper named MacArthur lying on the veldt near by, and on going over to him found that he had been wounded in the shoulder and hip, and that his injuries were such as to make it impossible for him to move. Although the fire from the Boer ambush was pretty hot and deadly at the time Sergt. Richardson picked the injured man up and carried him across the fire zone to a place of safety.

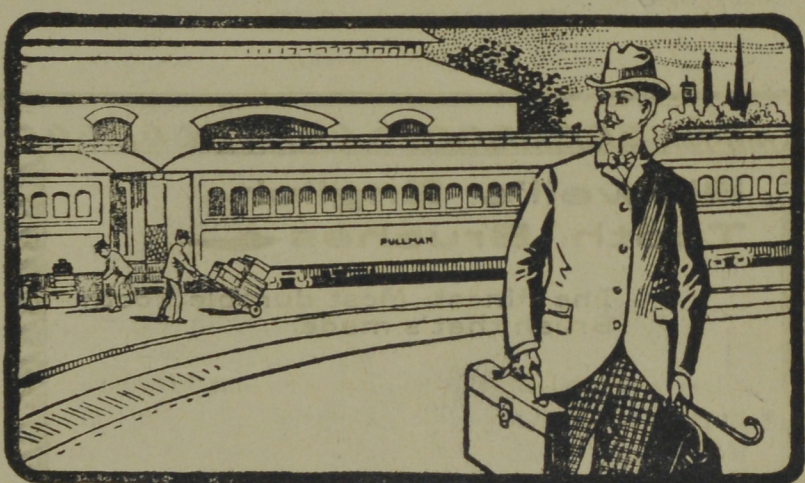
