A DOCTOR'S AWFUL DEATH.

In stepping on the train Dr. Page missed his footing and fell under the wheels and had one of his legs cut off, while the other was badly crushed. He was removed to the hospital where he died.

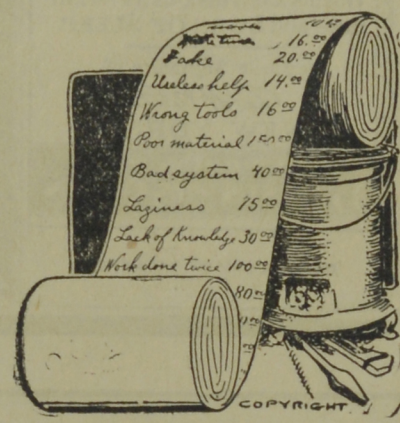
