THE CLAMSHELL DREDGE

Has Commenced Operations Below the
Normal School Wharf.

The clamshell dredge started operations this morning, just outside of the Normal School wharf and is attracting considerable attention. She is bringing to the surface an immense quantity of old rubbish, which is being deposited on a scow and dumped at a point about a mile below the city. The spectators who were watching the dredge at work about eleven o'clock this morning were somewhat surprised to see the scoop emerge from the water attached to a heavy stick of water logged wharf timber, fully thirty feet in length. Several of the attendants took hold of the monster with peevies as it came out of the water and steadied it while it was lowered to the deck of the scow. The stick was probably torn from one of the wharves by the ice several years ago.

The dredge now operating here was built at Gibson three years ago, especially for service on the St. John river and tributaries. She is in charge of Capt. McFadgon, and John Anderson, of The Barony, is the superintendent. She will probably find work enough along the city water front to keep her busy the remainder of the season.

Base Ball Notes.

MORE LIGHT

New Dynamo Installed at
The Electric Light
Station.MAY BE GIVEN A TRIAL THIS
EVENING.Other Important Additions
Made to The Plant.

The new arc light dynamo recently purchased by the Fredericton Electric Light Company from the Canadian General Electric Company of Toronto arrived here several days ago and has since been installed in the electric light station. It is termed a brush arc light machine and is of the most improved pattern. It has been set up under the superintendence of an expert from the factory, and will probably be given its first trial this evening.

The old street lamps are being replaced by new and more modern ones, and it is expected to have a number of them ready for use this evening. They are said to be a vast improvement on the old style of lamp, which has hitherto been in use here.

If the expectations formed regarding the new dynamo and lamps are realized, Fredericton will have an electric light service unsurpassed by that of any city or town in the Maritime Provinces. The old lamps had about outlived their usefulness, and citizens generally will be glad to learn that they have at last been replaced by something of a more modern nature.
