

PRESS VISITORS.

Upper Province Journalists will Arrive by Boat Tomorrow.

ABOUT ONE HUNDRED PERSONS IN THE PARTY

Will be Given a Drive About the City

AND WILL AFTERWARDS PAY A VISIT TO MARYSVILLE.

The Evening's Entertainment.

The upper province press excursionists numbering about one hundred ladies and gentlemen will arrive here from St. John by the steamer Weston at 3.30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. They will be met at the wharf by His Worship Mayor Crockett, members of the local press and other citizens, who will escort them to carriages in waiting and accompany them on a drive about the city. All the chief points of interest will be visited, after which the party will repair to the C.E.R. station, and embark by C. E. R. train for Marysville, to pay their respects to New Brunswick's lumber and cotton king. They will make a tour of the manufacturing establishments of the Nashwaak town, and return to Fredericton for tea at their hotels.

In the evening they will pay a visit to the parliament buildings, which will be lighted up for the occasion, and will afterwards repair to the bicycle and boating house, which has kindly been placed at their disposal by the members of the club. The band of the 71st regiment will render a program of music from the band stand in parliament square in honor of the visitors, and the members of the club will have canoes ready to give any of the visitors who care for it a paddle on river.

The party will take their departure on Wednesday morning by the Canada Eastern for Chatham Junction, where they will connect with the Intercolonial express going north. Superintendent Hoban is getting up a nobby train for the use of the visitors, and will see to it that they receive every care and attention during the trip across country. The special will consist of two passenger coaches, a smoker and a baggage car, and will be hauled by one of the most powerful engines owned by the road. It is quite likely that Supt. Hoban and passenger agent Robinson, Coun. Rowley, and a number of Fredericton business men and press representatives will accompany the party as far as Chatham Junction.
