

CONDITION CRITICAL

Ex-Premier Hardy of Ontario

PROSTRATED BY EFFECTS OF OPERATION FOR APPENDICITIS

His Family Anxiously Waiting at His Bedside.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Toronto, June 10.—There is no further development in the condition of Hon A S Hardy, ex-Premier of Ontario, this afternoon. He still lies in the general hospital in a critical condition as the result of an operation performed yesterday, for appendicitis.

He did not rally after the operation, as was hoped, and his family were summoned and are still at his bedside waiting some change.

[Mr. Hardy was a member of the Ontario government for twenty years, and premier for two years after the retirement of Sir Oliver Mowatt. He represented South Brant continuously during his political career and was never defeated. Owing to ill health he retired from public life nearly two years ago, accepting an office in the law courts at Toronto.]

THE RIVER AND DRIVES.

Prospects Bright for Stranded Lumber Drives Getting Out.

The water in the river fell a few here during last night, but a substantial rise is looked for in the course of a few days.

A telegram from Perth states that the river rose over a foot at that place since Saturday night, and that a number of corporation logs are running.

Advices from Edmundston state the river rose about two feet at that point during last night, and is still coming up quite rapidly.

A Fredericton man now on a business trip up river wired from Perth this morning that the prospects were favorable for a big rise of water.

John Kilburn left this afternoon for the Quebec lumber woods, to renew his stream driving operation. He has nine million feet stranded in the main river, about fifteen miles above Seven Islands, and is quite hopeful that it may now be got out. He has engaged a large crew of men at St Francis and expects to have them at work by Wednesday.

Belanzir's drive of three million feet is hung up just a few miles below Kilburn's.

But Doctors Have Reduced the Fracture.

William A. West of Hopewell Hill, Albert Co. who was very seriously injured by a fall from a staging on the Riverside hall last week, is reported to be somewhat improved Friday, though the nature of his injuries render his condition still exceedingly precarious. On a second examination the doctors found that the injured man's back bone had been dislocated. Friday night Dr Carnwath, assisted by Dr Chapman and Dr J T Lewis, of Hillsboro, successfully reduced the dislocation and placed the patient in a plaster jacket, the operation being very satisfactorily performed. The injured man is conscious and the spinal cord is not thought to be injured, so it is considered there is a fair chance of recovery.
