

INTERESTING RUMOR

Duchess of York May Not Accompany Her Husband Through Canada,

BUT MAY REMAIN AT QUEBEC OR OTTAWA

For an Important Expected Event.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Montreal, June 10.—A private letter from London received this morning brings an interesting rumor, which may if it proves correct, will interfere with the programme set down for the tour of their Royal Highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York in the Dominion.

The letter states that it is currently reported in society circles that Her Royal Highness is expecting an addition to her family, and that this interesting event is expected to take place about the time the royal party is scheduled to visit Canada.

Should this prove to be correct, it is quite possible that the Duke of Cornwall and York will have to make the trans-continental trip without the Duchess, who may have to remain either at Quebec or Ottawa until His Royal Highness' return.

C. P. R. SECTIONMEN

Likely to go out on Strike Before End of Present Week.

Montreal, June 10.—A general strike of sectionmen on the Canadian Pacific Railway is almost certain before the end of the week.

Negotiations between the grievance committee and General Manager McNeill have been broken off, and an ultimatum will now be presented to President Shaughnessy.

The crisis will be reached about Wednesday.

John T. Wilson, grand president of the track men's organization, today ordered a strike of the section men of the Maine Central Railway to take effect at five o'clock this afternoon. Eight hundred men are affected.

Eleven hundred sections on the C. P. R. employ thirty-four hundred men.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

Kitchener Reports Number of Boers Killed or Captured During May.

London, June 10.—Lord Kitchener in a despatch from Pretoria under today's date, says the number of Boers killed, imprisoned or surrendered during last month totalled 2,640. From June 1 to June 9, twenty-six Boers were killed, four were wounded, 409 were made prisoners and 33 surrendered, and 651 rifles, 115,550 rounds of ammunition, 120 wagons and 4,000 horses were captured.

A GHASTLY FIND.

POPULAR AUTHORS DEAD.

A THRILLING EXPERIENCE.

Dr. Coy of Prince William Narrowly Escapes Serious Injury.

Dr. Judson Coy, the well known and popular physician of Prince William, had a thrilling experience a short time ago, which came near costing him his leg and perhaps his life. It seems he had driven

his father-in-law, John Ingraham, down a lane leading to the river, and had turned around to return home, when a rather singular thing occurred. He was moving about at a slow walk, when without the slightest warning, the snap holding one of the reins to the bit gave way, causing the rein to fall to the horse's side. The horse he was driving was his spirited pacer, Daisy Glen, and the mishap to the rein caused her to increase her pace a little. Realizing he had no control over the animal the doctor dropped the reins and sprang out of the carriage, with the intention of taking her by the head. In the excitement of the moment he failed to notice a telegraph pole close by and the result was that in jumping his shoulders brought up against it with considerable force, causing him to lose his balance and fall to the ground. In falling his right foot was thrust between two of the spokes of the front wheel, and was carried up over the hub and down on to the shaft. His cries for help brought Mr. Ingraham, who fortunately was only a few yards away to his assistance, and taking in the situation at a glance, he at once stopped the mare and extricated the doctor from his perilous position. Had the mare gone a yard further the doctor's leg would have been broken and mangled, and had help not been near the mishap might have cost him his life. As it was his foot received a bad wrench, and he afterwards found that the ligaments had been torn away from his ankle bone on the outside. The accident caused him a great deal of pain and it will be some weeks before he entirely recovers from its effects.

LICENSE EXAMINATIONS

There Are Nearly Two Hundred Applicants Altogether.

The examination for teachers' license will commence tomorrow in the assembly hall of the Normal School in this city and also at St. John. The examinations here will be conducted personally by Dr J. R. Inch. There are 4 applicants for grammar school license, 44 for class I, 4 for superior school license, and 110 for class II, making a total of 168.

The number who will take the examination at St. John is 26, including 9 for grammar school, 13 for first class, I for superior, and 3 for second class.

A SAD MEETING.

Pathetic Incident Occurred at Sydney.

Sydney, N. S., June 10.—Archibald Russell, of Conception Bay, was instantly killed Saturday afternoon at the construction works by the falling of a block and tackle, which struck him on the head. A pathetic incident in connection with his death is the fact that on that day his father arrived from Newfoundland to visit him. Arriving at the gates he was not allowed in, so remained outside all the afternoon awaiting the appearance of his son. At 4.30 o'clock the remains of the son were borne through the gate. A very affecting scene took place when the father recognized the body.

The father returned today to Newfoundland, taking the remains with him. This accident makes three killed since last Sunday—Hamilton, Moxham and Russell. It is estimated that over one hundred and fifty have been killed and injured at the works of the steel company since they began operations here.
