Lectures on Law.

The King's College law school, St John has secured the services of J D Poinney, C, and H A Powell, K C, as lecturers in their course on subjects to be announced later.

New Church at St Mary's.

The congregation of St. Mary's R. C. church are moving the church building and making preparations for the erection of their new edifice which will be proceeded with at once.

More Improvements to St. Dunstan's.

The new stained glass windows for St. Dunstan's church are being placed in position this week. New pews are to be added to the improvements already made on the church, and possibly a new hardwood floor may be laid also.

The Fatted Calf.

James L Grant, of Macnaquac, had in the market this morning a carcass of veal which tipped the scales at 133 pounds. This is said to be the largest carcass of veal brought to the city this season. Mr Grant says the calf was six weeks old when butchered.

Graduated at McGill.

B. E. Wiley and Walter T Ryan, of this city, have graduated in medicine at McGill University. Roy McL Vanwart, formerly of this city, captured the prize for highest aggregate in all subjects, third year, and Sutherland gold medal for general and medical chemistry.

Leased a Residence.

The Herald cordially welcomes Mr. George A. Murchie, ex-mayor of Calais, and ex-representative in the Maine legislature, to citizenship in Fredericton, even if only temporarily. Mr. Murchie, who is interested in large milling property here, has leased the Judge Fisher residence for the summer, and with his family will occupy it immediately.

Meductic Mail Service.

The contract for carrying the mails between Fredericton and Meductic has been awarded to John Macpherson, livery stable keeper of this city. The work is at present being performed by John McCoy under a temporary arrangement with the Post Office Inspector. Mr. Macpherson's contract goes into effect on July 1st. It is understood that there was quite a number of tenderers.

The Boardman Collection.

The splendid collection of stuffed birds, game heads, etc, purchased by the government from the late George A. Boardman, is now being set up in the old Supreme court chamber. Deputy Surveyor General Flewelling is superintending the work and is confident that in a short time the old Supreme court chamber will be converted into one of the best Natural history museums to be found on the continent.

Hand Organ and Monkey.

An Italian organ grinder and a very intelligent monkey attracted considerable attention about the streets here Saturday. The monkey in addition to the gathering in all the coppers thrown in his direction, gave an occasional exhibition of ball tossing to the great delight of the children. Occasionally he would take a squirt at his homely physog in a small looking glass carried by the grinder.

Will Wed This Evening.

Elbridge Albert Peckard, a former resident of this city, but now a prosperous merchant of Boston, is to be married at West Somerville Mass, this evening, to Miss Daisy Isabell Wilbur, also a former resident of this city. After the ceremony a reception will be held at the residence of the bride's uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. James L. Brown. The prospective bride and bridegroom have many friends in this city, who will join with the Herald in wishing them every happiness.

To Join the Benedicts.

R B H Phillips, of the Post Office staff is to be married on Wednesday to Mrs Mabel Edgcombe. The ceremony is to be preformed at the home of the bride's parents at eight o'clock p.m. On Saturday evening Mr Phillips was made the recipient of a very handsome clock by the members of the post office staff. Post Master Hilyard made the presentation in

a neat speech, in which he heartily congratulated Mr Phillips and extended to him the felicitations of himself and the members of the staff. Mr Phillips, although taken completely by surprise made a suitable reply, returning thanks to the Postmaster and officials for their kindness.

Officers Transferred.

Capt. Nagle and Capt. Thacker of the R. C. R. I., have received orders to leave this station. The former goes to the London depot as adjutant, and the latter to Quebec, and both are to report for their new duties July 1. Lieut Lister of the Quebec school and Capt Layborn of Quebec, are to be the new officers here. The former is a son of Judge Lister of Toronto, a former prominent Liberal M.P., and the latter was through the South African campaign. Layborn is 31 years of age and has been three years in the permanent force. He served in South Africa with the 2nd Special Service of the R. C. R. I. Lister is 28 years of age and joined the R. C. R. I. in March, 1898.

Other officers of the R C R I transferred by the same order are: Capt Carpenter from London to Toronto, Capt Kaye from Quebec to Toronto, Lieut Leduc and Lieut Carton from Quebec to St John's.

Mr. Gregory an Author.

The Antigonish Casket says that Mr. Chas. C. Gregory, barrister of that place, but for some months past residing in England, has just published, through the firm of William Clowes & Sons, London, a law book on a subject hitherto untreated by text writers—"The Engineer or Architect as the Arbitrator Between the Employer and the Contractor." The publication is a surprise, as Mr. Gregory's labors on the book, we understand, were known to no one. The MS. was begun several years ago, in Toronto, as a means of filling in leisure and without any intention of publishing. [Mr. Gregory is a native of Fredericton, a brother of Judge and A. J. Gregory, the well known barrister, and after a successful career as an eminent civil engineer, took up the study of law, and secured admission to the bar of Nova Scotia, and that of Ontario.]

Sunday's Funerals.

The funeral of the late Leverett Blizard took place from his home at the Mills at two o'clock Sunday afternoon, and despite the wet weather was very largely attended. The remains were taken to the C of E church, where funeral services were conducted by Rev Canon Roberts. Interment was made at Forest Hill. John G Adams, undertaker.

The remains of the late Moses Bailey of Nashwaaksis, were interred in the Pickard burying ground on Sunday afternoon. An impressive funeral service was conducted at his late home by Rev Benson Bellies, and was very largely attended. Robert B Adams was the officiating undertaker.

A Winner of Philadelphia.

At the commencement exercises of the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, Wednesday morning next, a St. John student will receive distinguished honors. The student is Mr William P. Broderick, brother of Dr Broderick. He has just finished the three years' course in dentistry and leads a class of 170 with the very high average of 94.1. Mr Broderick's average for the past year was 97 points. Dr Broderick will return to St John after securing his degree of D.D.S.—Telegraph. [Glad to hear of Mr Broderick's success, but he is a Fredericton and not a St John boy, a son of the late P Broderick of this city, and received his education in Fredericton schools.]

Retiring from the Service.

An Ottawa despatch says: It is learned that Henry J Costigan, collector of inland revenue for the city of Ottawa, has forwarded his resignation to the minister of inland revenue. Costigan is a son of Hon John Costigan. He was transferred to Ottawa from Winnipeg, where he had been collector a few years ago. During the past year he has not been in good health and consequently has decided to retire from the service. His resignation has therefore been accepted and will take effect on July 1st next. He will receive a retiring allowance, as he comes under the new civil service act.

Wedding Bells.

Miss Lillian M. Green, daughter of Mr and Mrs Kenneth Green of this city, was married at Baldwinville, Mass., on May 29th to Harry A. Clarke, of that place. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Hopkins, a Baptist clergyman, in the presence of a few relatives and friends. The bride has for some time been on the nursing staff of the hospital at Baldwinville. She is a most estimable young lady and will have the best wishes of numerous friends in this city for her future happiness.

DEATH OF MRS. CHIPMAN.

Mother of Lady Tilley Passed Peacefully to Her Rest.

The death occurred on Saturday afternoon at her residence, St Stephen, of Mrs Mary E Chipman at the age of 82.

Mrs Chipman was taken sick on Tuesday last with acute bronchitis, which developed into bronchial pneumonia and resulted in her death.

She was a daughter of the late William H DeWolfe and was born at Wolfville, Nova Scotia, and married the late Zachariah Chipman in 1842. She was a member of the Methodist church. For some time deceased has led a retired life at her home, The Cedars. Nine children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Chipman, of whom two sons and two daughters died in early life, and Florence, wife of Owen Jones, died in the fall of 1899.

The surviving members of the family are Alice, Lady Tilley, widow of the late Sir Leonard Tilley; Annie, wife of Colonel Toller of the finance department, Ottawa; Laura, widow of the late Major W. H. Howland, of Toronto, and Major J. D. Chipman of St. Stephen.
