Sept. 17.—The committee of directors of the Fredericton and Woodstock Steamboat Company, to whom was assigned the work of constructing said boat, held a business meeting on Sept. 12th at Kingsclear, York Co., and unanimously decided to begin the work of construction at once, and by common consent have chosen G W Brown, the promoter of the scheme, as their manager, which we deem a wise and proper thing to do. Surely the man who has the brain to draft the model of such a vessel as may be necessary, and adapted to the purposes required, placing every timber and bolt in its proper place and after a careful and critical scrutiny by expert engineers and men of good practical common sense, and proved to be all right, may be safely entrusted with the supervision of its construction, notwithstanding the contrary views of some who are not friendly to the scheme. According to the above arrangements operations have begun, and will be pushed as speedily as possible.
