JUDGE DAVIES.

Federal politics and the House of Commons at Ottawa without the presence of Sir Louis Davies will be a novelty, and yet the familiar face of the brilliant P. E. Island member will no longer be seen at his desk in the front row of government benches in the popular chamber.

Sir Louis is now a judge of the Supreme court of Canada, his appointment having been made Saturday evening, and there is a vacancy in the House of Commons and in the cabinet circle.

The honor to Sir Louis is everywhere recognized as well deserved, and the court gains a bright member by his admission to its ranks. He takes the place of the late Judge King.

Sir Louis is a native of Charlottetown and is nearly fifty-seven years old. He was called to the P. E. Island bar in 1866, and entered political life as a member of the Island legislature in 1872, sitting in that body till 1879 when he was defeated. He was returned to the House of Commons in 1882 and has been re-elected at every general election since. He was called to the premiership of P. E. Island, Sept 1876, and also occupied the position of attorney general, until the defeat of his government three years later. During the years between 1882 and 1896 Sir Louis was one of the most valiant Liberal opposition fighters at Ottawa, and did good service for his party both in Parliament and on the stump. When Sir Wilfred Laurier formed his government in July 1896, Sir Louis was called to the portfolio of Marine and Fisheries and has filled that position with great ability.

Sir Louis has long been known as an eminent lawyer, and has been engaged as counsel in many prominent cases. In 1877 he was Canadian counsel before the International Fishery commission at Halifax and rendered the country valuable service in that connection. In 1897 he was joint delegate with Sir Wilfrid Laurier to Washington on the Behring Sea seal question, and was one of the joint high commissioners appointed by Great Britain in 1898 for settlement of all differences with the United States in respect of Canada. He was created K.C.M.G. in 1897.

Sir Louis, both from a political and professional standpoint, has won the high position to which he has now been called and his friends all over Canada will wish him many years of usefulness on the bench.

The Duke and Duchess of York were photographed by Notman during their stay at Lord Stratcona's residence at Montreal. The Duke was a little late in keeping his appointment, but the Duchess was on hand in good time, and like many another good wife, was compelled to mildly admonish her spouse for his tardiness. "Do hurry up George; we really must not delay the proceedings," was the gentle admonition of Her Royal Highness.

It is believed that Senator Mark Hanna has lost his grip on national politics in the United States by the death of President McKinley. The Senator was the late president's most trusted adviser, but does not enjoy the personal confidence of Mr. Roosevelt.

One of the directors of the late exhibition informs the Herald that he believes the revenue from the show will cover every account against it, and perhaps leave a small balance. This condition of things is most gratifying.

The Herald regrets to learn of the death at Toronto of Mr. Thomas Milburn, president of the wholesale drug and proprietary medicine firm of T. Milburn & Co. We have had very satisfactory business dealings with Mr. Milburn for years, and always found him honorable and prompt in the discharge of his obligations. He was a good citizen of Toronto, and will be very sincerely mourned by a large circle of friends.

The Halifax exhibition was open seven days and the attendance numbered 60,000 in a city of 40,000 population with well peopled country districts to draw from. The Fredericton exhibition held in a city of 7,000 people and open only four days had an attendance of 14,000. Halifax has a deficit of \$10,000 while the Fredericton exhibition, it is expected, will have a balance on the right side.

Moncton Transcript: Fredericton has made a great success of the provincial fair. It availed itself of St John's off year, and the people in its vicinity availed themselves of the exhibition. It is estimated that the attendance of visitors at Fredericton and the exhibition on one day was equal to the city's entire population. The provincial capital by its pluck deserved the success won.

News from Ottawa regarding the successor to Sir Louis Davies in the cabinet is contradictory. The Telegraph's despatches say that no appointment will be made at present, while the Sun has information that Hon. Dr. Borden will become Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and Hon. James Sutherland Minister of Militia.

Rev. Principal Grant, of Queen's University, Kingston, who has just returned from a trip to England, is critically ill from cold contracted on shipboard, and was unable to be at Ottawa Saturday to receive the honor of C.M.G. conferred on him by the King.

The wrong date has been given out from Ottawa for Thanksgiving day. It will be on Thursday, Nov. 28th, not Oct. 31st as announced last week. The date is entirely too late in the season.

St. John and Halifax will have to learn from Fredericton how to run an exhibition without a deficit.

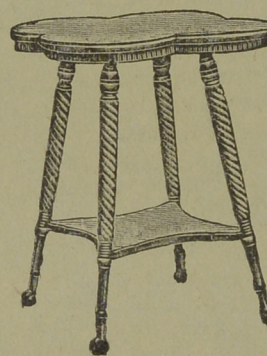
