

DUKE AND DUCHESS

Spent the Forenoon With
Ottawa Lumbermen.

SAW THE MEN ACTUALLY AT
WORK AS IN THE BUSH.

Exciting Ride Down the Ottawa
in Birch Canoes.

ECHOES OF SATURDAY'S GREAT
EVENTS AT THE CAPITAL.

Ottawa, Sept. 23.—A beautiful, bright, mild morning greeted the royal party for their water excursion.

Sharp at 10.30 the party emerged from the government house gates and were conveyed to the Oregon street wharf in the royal electric car especially constructed.

The cribs were boarded and the royal party started on their trip through the famous logslide to the river below. Everything went merrily and without a hitch, the party hugely enjoying their novel experience.

When the river was reached the party were transferred to birch canoes and with row boats in attendance the procession formed and started for Rockcliffe where their Royal Highnesses witnessed a genuine log rolling performance specially arranged.

The party then adjourned to the lumbermen's shanty where a genuine back woods lumber camp was set up and men were at work as though in their accustomed backwoods quarters.

Later on a shanty dinner was served the men as if in the regular bush, and Their Royal Highnesses were greatly amused at their crude manner of living.

After the informal luncheon was served Their Royal Highnesses, in a handsome pavillion, they returned to government house.

Ottawa, Sept. 23.—Parliament Hill witnessed two striking events Saturday—the unveiling of the Queen's national statue and the presentation of medals to the South African veterans.

Draped over on a knoll at the west side of the parliament buildings was the statue of her late majesty the Queen, and for the unveiling the militia made a beautiful picture. Surrounding the statue were 100 men of the governor general's foot guards in their bright uniforms and the full band. At the base of the statue the other regiments were drawn up, the red coats in advance, with the dragoons and the battery on the north side and the 43rd battalion on the south east.

At a quarter to 12 o'clock every one of the cabinet ministers, accompanied by their wives and daughters, were in their places.

At six minutes to 12 there was a sharp bugle call, and His Excellency and Lady Minto, accompanied by the governor's aide de camps, drove up amid a cheer from the assembled thousands. With them was the usual vice regal escort.

With the party of the governor general was the two aide de camps of the Duke of York, the Viscount Creighton and the Duke of Roxborough. The Hon Sir Wilfrid Laurier met the party and welcomed them.

Then another bugle call and another royal escort galloped up, and in a carriage behind was the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York.

Without any formality the duke and duchess stepped out of the carriage and walked up the steps to the stand, on a crimson carpet that had been laid for the occasion. The prime minister welcomed his royal highness and chatted to him for a while, while the duchess met several ladies of the party.

The Duke was received with great acclaim and the band played God Save the King, and the people cheered, while the soldiers gave the royal salute.

The Duke, after he had spoken to Sir Wilfrid, walked over to the pedestal of the monument. Without any ceremony he pulled the cord that loosened the covering of the monument, and the statue of the Queen stood forth for the first time.

Then occurred the greatest demonstration of all. The people on the hill caught up the national anthem and sang it with a will; cabinet ministers and bootblacks, high and low, young and old, all joined in and the earnest nature of the reception

seemed to please the royal party for they bowed several times.

Then the duke in a good voice spoke a few words to the assembled crowd. His royal highness has an excellent voice and the people for a good many yards round could hear what was said.

His Royal Highness said that he was pleased to join the citizens of Canada in unveiling this beautiful piece of statuary to the memory of her late majesty Queen Victoria. Her beautiful life and her love for her people had endeared her to all and it was fitting that she should be honored by her people. It is, said he, with loving respect and admiration that I unveil this monument to her great and noble life. She was, as has been said, a mother to her people.

The speech of his royal highness did not occupy more than a minute. Then the band played God Save the King. The people on the roofs of the buildings and on the grounds cheered again. The duchess was evidently pleased at the reception for she bowed and smiled more than once.

Directly after the unveiling of Queen Victoria's monument, the soldiers who were to receive medals for service in South Africa walked in single file to near the foot of the statue, where the duke was. The medals were laid on the table, and as each man approached, the Duke of Roxborough handed a medal to the Duke of Cornwall and York, and the latter gave it over to the man for whom it was intended. Each man's name was called out as he approached.

The third man to step up was Lieut. Eddie Holland, of Ottawa, who was to get the Victoria Cross.

A short summary of the action of Koomatipoont, in which Lieut. Holland performed the work that won the honor for him, was read. The duke then shook hands with Lieut. Holland, congratulated him on his valor and pinned the cross to his breast. The three nurses, Misses Hurcomb, Richardson and Forbes, were loudly cheered.

The climax of enthusiasm was reached when Trooper Mulloy, the blind hero, was led up, escorted by Lieut. Holland. His approach was noticed by Her Royal Highness, who evidently spoke to the Duke concerning him. In presenting the medal to Mulloy, His Royal Highness told the blind trooper that he was very glad to meet him and sorry to know that he had lost his sight. He inquired as to the action through which he had passed. Her Royal Highness also spoke to Mulloy, telling him that her sister, the Duchess of Teck, had spoken to her concerning him. "When I go home," said the Duchess, "I will tell my sister that I had the pleasure of meeting you." When he was in Wynberg hospital the blind trooper was visited by the Duchess of Teck, who gave him an arm chair and evinced much sympathy. Mulloy was given an ovation from the crowd.

Most of the Ottawa veterans appeared in khaki despite the orders of the major general to the contrary and thus received their medals.

At luncheon in Rideau Hall Friday, at which the Duke of Cornwall was the guest of honor there was but one toast, that of "The King."

There was a large attendance at garden party at Rideau Hall Saturday afternoon. Their royal highnesses walked around and talked with the guests in a gracious and friendly manner.

The illuminations of the buildings were repeated Saturday night and their royal highnesses drove through the parliament grounds about 10.30. They were attended by an escort. This was the first opportunity the royal party had of seeing the electrical display with which they were greatly pleased.

The Royal party, after dinner at government house, Saturday evening, drove up town to see the illuminations. A band concert was in progress on Parliament Hill, and when the Duke and Duchess reached the front of the main building they were cheered by thousands, a recognition which was as much appreciated as unexpected. The Royal Canadian Dragoons furnished the escort.

Sunday was spent quietly. That morning their Royal Highnesses and Lady Minto accompanied by the Governor General, attended divine service at Christ Church Cathedral, but there was no ostentatious display, the only indication of anything unusual being the mounted escort. The church was packed to overflowing. Rev. Mr. Kitson, the rector, preached the sermon.

In the afternoon their Royal Highnesses rested quietly at government house. A few guests were especially invited to meet the distinguished visitors at dinner last night.

Exhibition Receipts.

The amount mentioned in Saturday night's Herald as being the total receipts of the exhibition, included the proceeds of the dog and pony circus. The amount realized from the sale of admission tickets alone was in the vicinity of \$3,400.

Mrs. Manzors Death.

Mrs Mary A. wife of Charles Manzer, an employe of A. F. Randolph & Sons, died yesterday at her home on Queen street. She had been in failing health for some time and her death was not unexpected. The deceased lady was a daughter of the late John West of this city and was 70 years of age. In addition to a husband she is survived by a family of two daughters, Mrs I. V. Brown and Miss Mary Manzer of this city, and one son, Parker C Manzer of New York. The funeral will take place at ten o'clock tomorrow morning, Rev. J. H. MacDonald officiating. The remains will be taken to Nashua for interment. George W. Adams has charge of the arrangements.
