

GEN. SHERMAN'S ORDER.

Send Prisoners Over Points Where Torpedoes are Suspected.

London, September 20.—The executive committee of the Army League has published the following extracts from orders issued by General Sherman in 1864, while the American civil war was in progress, with the suggestion that they might be put in operation against the Boer guerillas in South Africa.

"You may order all your post and district commanders that guerillas are not soldiers, but wild beasts, unknown to the usage of war. To be recognized as soldiers they must be enlisted, enrolled, officered, uniformed, armed and equipped by some recognized belligerent power, and must if detached from a main army be of sufficient strength, with written orders from some military army commander to do some military thing.

"The use of torpedoes in blowing up our cars and the road after they are in our possession in simply malicious. It cannot alter the great problem, but simply makes trouble. Now if torpedoes are found in the possession of an enemy to our rear you may cause them to be put on the ground and tested by wagon loads of prisoners or if need be by citizens implicated in their use.

"In like manner, if a torpedo is suspected on any part of the road, order the point to be tested by a carload of prisoners, drawn by a long rope. Of course the enemy cannot complain of his own traps."

A message was received at Winnipeg Friday by Lt. Gov. McMillan stating that H. R. H., the Duke of York would not be able to officiate at the laying of the corner of the memorial monument to Queen Victoria. The announcement was received with general disappointment and the government is tearing down the platforms, arches and decorations intended for the event. Mr. Justice Bain, the Chairman of the Memorial Committee expresses keen disappointment and Premier Roblin, the Honourary President, says: "While it will in no way prevent the monument from being completed, we feel it keenly. We will, however, endeavour to perpetuate the memory of our late beloved Queen in our own small way, as far as marble and brass can do so, but we feel much regret at the inability of the Duke to do this honour to his honoured grand-parent."

For every 110 civilians, 380 soldiers commit suicide in Great Britain.

A record pine log, 94 feet long, 19 inches square and perfectly straight, was recently landed at Leith.

Italy and Spain have fewer houses in proportion to population than any other country. The Argentine Republic has most.

Since 1840 European towns have increased 470 per cent. in population, while in the country districts, increase has been but 70 per cent.

Britain digs canals more cheaply than other countries. The average cost of English canals being £9,600 a mile, against £10,000 in France and £15,500 in Canada.

Potatoes have ceased to be the principal root crop of Ireland, if they are to be compared with turnips by weight or yield—last year, for example, only about 1,542,000 tons, against 4,426,000 tons of turnips.
