

AWARDED THE V. C.

Dr. Douglas, a Canadian Surgeon,

RECOGNIZED FOR BRAVE ACT

At the Battle of Magersfontein.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Toronto, May 2.—Dr. H. E. Douglas, a graduate of Queen's College, Kingston, and whose home is now in Kingston, Jamaica, has received the Victoria Cross for bravery in action. Dr. Douglas was attached to the Gordon Highlanders as surgeon.

It was at the battle of Magersfontein that he so distinguished himself. He was with the Black Watch on its death march, and when the fire opened, though slightly wounded, crawled, amid the bullets, to the head of the column. The officers of his regiment were lying about dead or wounded. He dressed the wounds of all within reach, and made his way back in safety. He then rallied the scattered ranks of the Gordons and led them out of action. He was wounded by a bursting shell, which carried away part of his cheek.

SUICIDE IDENTIFIED.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

London, May 2.—A despatch from Lord Kitchener says: "Grenfell attacked the Boers at Bergplatz, where the last long Tom opened fire at 10,000 yards. Kitchener's scouts advanced to within 3,000 yards, when the gun was blown up and the Boers fled. Ten of them were made prisoners. "Other columns report ten Boers killed,

six made prisoners and sixty surrendered, and 30,000 rounds of ammunition captured. The British had four killed and seven wounded."

KITCHENER RESPONSIBLE

For the Disastrous Attack on Cronje's Lager.

London, May 2.—Sir Henry Colville's belated despatch on the fight at Paardeberg, which is just now published, nearly fourteen months after it was written, makes it quite clear that Lord Kitchener was in effective command of the British forces on the occasion of the disastrous attack on Cronje's lager on February 18, 1900. Seemingly by weakening Colville's brigade he made that disaster, which cost the country 1,000 men, possible. It must be some satisfaction to Colville to know that the public now realizes that it was he who planned and suggested the fatal advance which brought about Cronje's surrender.

STILL ANOTHER CANADIAN.
