

EXPRESS DITCHED.

Fearful Accident to a Railway Train.

FOURTEEN PASSENGERS KILLED.

And Nearly Half a Hundred Injured.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Peru, Ind., June 26.—The west bound passenger train, No. 3, the Wabash limited from Boston for St. Louis, was ditched 9 miles west of Peru last night.

Fourteen Italians were killed and two died on the way to the city. Two more probably will die.

Forty passengers were injured including Mrs William Cotton, wife of the Gen Supt of the Iron Mountain railway, formerly of the Grand Trunk of Montreal.

TRACKMEN'S STRIKE

No Change in Situation but C. P. R. Claim Bottom has Dropped Out.

Montreal, June 26.—There is no change in the trackmen strike.

Montreal, June 26.—So little is now thought of the trackmen's strike on the C. P. R. that the papers here scarcely refer to it.

The general feeling is that the company is in the right this time and that the strikers are following old Kroger's plan of keeping up a useless fight, injuring themselves far more than the company.

The lack of sympathy with the strikers shown by the Toronto labor union, is also apparent here and it now seems to be more of a matter of personal prestige for John G. Wilson.

It is admitted on all sides that a bad blunder has been made in attacking a company known to treat its employees better than any of its neighbors or even than the government itself does.

THE COST OF WAR.

London, June 26.—The South African war, as usual, was the subject of innumerable questions in the House of Commons yesterday. Little information was elicited except that it continued to cost 1,250,000 weekly, that the authorities estimated that the invaders of Cape Colony numbered from 1,000 to 2,000 men and that there had been 1,484 cases of typhoid fever among the troops during the month of April of which 187 had proven fatal.

KILLED THE FIREMAN.
