HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Save your cold tea for the vinegar barrel. It sours easily and gives color and flavor.

Cleaning windows with borax instead of ammonia or soap takes much less time than the ordinary way and is a success.

Never buy butter which has a milky look or is dotted with pink spots. This is a sign that it has not been thoroughly washed from the buttermilk and will quickly turn sour or lose its flavor.

To clean chandelier globes that have become smoked and grimy they should be left for some minutes in hot water in which a piece of washing soda has been dissolved. Afterward wash them in hot water with a little ammonia, scouring the discolored parts with a small, not too stiff, brush.

An excellent gargle for sore throat or hoarseness is made by boiling a teaspoonful of pure honey in a cup of water.

Cinders or any of the particles that seek lodgment in the eye are best removed by first closing the eye until it is filled with tears. Next turn the lid back and use the edge of a handkerchief or a looped hair to remove the cinder.

Common, everyday earth is a cure for many an ache or pain. In the case of a burn from an acid the chief thing is to apply an alkali to neutralize the acid. This may be done by gathering a handful of earth and laying it on the injured part, for the earth contains alkali enough to render it very efficacious. Soda may be used for an acid burn.
