READ THE NEWSPAPERS.

Such advice as is contained in the above heading is scarcely necessary in these days, when to neglect the columns of the press is to write oneself down as ignorant of what is occurring in the world around us, but the counsel is emphasized by Mr. W. H. Moody, secretary of the United States Navy, in a recent magazine article, "What a Young Man Should Read Today."

Mr. Moody believes in every young man accumulating a library of the best books, but he strongly advises the perusal of good newspapers every day, in the following words:

"Every man should read one good newspaper each day. I do not mean, of course, that he should read everything in it; but he should go over the entire contents, carefully making his selections and reading attentively the articles which give promise of being helpful or instructive. The weekly, and more particularly, the monthly reviews are also of great value, from the fact that they familiarize their readers with current history—which after all, is the most important history—while at the same time possessing some advantages over the daily newspapers, because the editors are not compelled to accept first reports and also have opportunity to correct any inaccuracies which may creep into hurriedly prepared discussions of subjects. Nevertheless, these reviews must ever but supplement the daily newspapers, for we are not content in this age to wait until the end of the month for our news."

SYMPATHY FOR MR CHAMBERLAIN.

Mr Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, is receiving much sympathy for the accident which befel him Monday. He is easily the most prominent of Great Britain's eminent statesmen, and is especially esteemed in the colonies with which he has much to do in an official way. His injuries are not severe—a face considerably cut by glass, and it is hoped he will be on duty again in a few days. The King and one of his chief counsellors laid up at the same time is an unfortunate condition, but the wheels of the government will move along just the same, however large a place the afflicted ones may occupy in its machinery and in the public eye.

NG AND CORONATION.

The King is recovering so rapidly that the coronation is now talked of for the middle of August. It is doubtful however if His Majesty will be sufficiently recovered at that date to undergo the excitement and fatigue of such a ceremony. He is to be taken for a trip in a yacht as soon as he can be safely moved, and it will probably be September before the coronation takes place. The ceremony will be shorn of much of its glory through the postponement, and it will probably be the King's desire that the affair be quietly celebrated.

In the meantime His Majesty's subjects all over the Empire are exulting at the excellent progress he is making towards convalescence.

SIR WILFRED LAURIER IN LONDON.

The Herald's favors from friends in England include issues of late London newspapers, and their columns teem with complimentary sketches of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who is regarded by far as the most prominent of Colonial visitors.

The following from the London Daily

Telegraph of June 23 is but a sample of the nice things the big metropolitan papers are saying of Sir Wilfrid, and the attention he is receiving will be extremely gratifying to Canadians of every political stripe:

"Among the Colonial Premiers assembled for the coronation solemnities, a rare and notable figure is Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of the Dominion of Canada, a man of whom any empire might be proud. Of French descent, he is yet thoroughly one of us. His family came from the banks of the Loire; he is now building up, consciously and designedly, a great British State. Speaking in self-defence eight years ago, in a passage often misquoted, he says of himself:

"I am true to my race, I am true to Canada, I am true to England, and I am above all, true to the cause and of liberty and justice. Sir, I am of French origin, and I have the pride of my race; but in politics I am an English Liberal. The principles which I profess, such as they are, are the outgrowth of study and reflection. They did not come to me from the land of my ancestors. They came to me from England, from the great mother of modern liberty. I belong to the school of those men who fill the pages of English history, who always faced the great to get the right. I belong to the school of Hampden and Pym, of Russell and Somers, and of Burke."

Needless to say that the man who spoke these sentences is an orator. He is known as "The silver-tongued Laurier." His native province and its capital, Quebec, he won by a famous speech over thirty years ago, and when three years later he made his debut in the Dominion Parliament he surprised and thrilled the House by an address in faultless English. Oratory does not make a great man, but it gains the man who is great a hearing. When Mr. Edward Blake gave up the apparently hopeless leadership of the Liberal party at Ottawa, and became member for South Longford, Sir Wilfrid Laurier succeeded him, having already spent eighteen years in the cold shade of Opposition. Under the leadership of Sir John Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper, men who had framed the constitution of the Dominion—probably the finest federal constitution in the world—the sway of the Conservative party seemed to be invincible. Sir Wilfrid Laurier led the Liberals to power, and he has now been six years premier, the first French Canadian to hold the position. He has taken the men of his race, and his fellow Catholics of the Lower Province with him. When Mr. Kruger's commandoes invaded Natal and Cape Colony it was said that the French Canadians had little enthusiasm for the British cause, and only one man living, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, could have persuaded them to participate in it.

It was the good fortune of the Empire, at the critical moment when power changed sides in Canada, that there was a man to the front who possessed racial and religious sympathies with the minority, who had a large vision for his country as part of a world-wide sovereignty, and whom all parties trusted. Sir John Macdonald, his great opponent, once remarked: "I can trust Laurier without the slightest fear. He is incapable of breaking his word, even if he wished too." Was finer testimony ever given to a public man?"

The London Daily Chronicle speaking of the Conference of Colonial Premiers, says that it has good reason to declare that Canada will offer nothing further than it has already offered in the direction of preferential trade with Great Britain and as the financial position of the Australian Federation will prevent it from giving Great Britain any substantial preference for some years to come, that the conferences are not likely to have practical results.
