Chairman Clark has notified the Chatham authorities to that effect and expects a reply in a few days.

Festival Chorus.

Accident to Michael Moore.

Michael Moore, son of Ald John Moore, met with a serious and painful accident at his father's marble works yesterday afternoon. He was blowing off exhaust steam from the boiler, when a monkey wrench with which he had opened the valve, slipped throwing him right into the path of the escaping steam. His left arm was badly scalded from the elbow

down, and his right arm also injured. He was at once taken to his home where his injuries were attended to by a physician. He will probably be laid on the shelf a week or fortnight as a result of the accident.

Youngest Son of the Chancellor of the University Leads a Bride to the Altar

Wednesday, he was married to Miss Florence Jackson, of Wingham, Ontario, at the residence of her brother, Mr. Jackson of Calgary. Miss Jackson is a sister of Mrs. G. T. Bragg, and resided for some time with her sister in this town.

Exciting Runaway.

A runaway team created some excitement on Queen street about six o'clock last evening. It started from the Canada Eastern station, and proceeded up Queen street to Court House Square and thence around Campbell street and out Regent to Queen. In turning the corner it collided with James H. Crockett's carriage, containing his two children, both of whom were thrown out by the shock. They were taken to Burchill's drug store where it was found that both had escaped injury, though a wheel of the carriage had passed over one of them. The runaway team was captured near the new rink, after the carriage and harness had been considerably damaged. Mr. Crockett's horse was captured on Campbell street, before it had done much damage.

Police Court.

The Kimball assault case was further postponed by Col. Marsh this morning until Tuesday of next week. Mr. Kimball, the victim of the alleged assault, is suffering from a broken leg and it will be some time before he will be able to attend court to give his testimony.

Another assault case, in which constable Henry Carrie, of Royal Road, is the complainant, and George W. Robertson, of St. Marys, the defendant, was before the court this morning, but on the application of James Holland, attorney for the prosecution, and with the consent of H. F. McLeod, counsel for the defendant, was postponed until next Tuesday.

A Narrow Escape.

An accident which might have been very serious, befell Alex. Atkinson an employee of Ald. Moore's marble works, yesterday afternoon. He was assisting to cut a bar of iron, and a piece about a foot long which flew into the air on becoming detached, descended and struck him fair on top of the head. He was knocked down by the shock, and the jagged end of the iron inflicted a bad cut on his head. His injuries were found to be very slight, however, and he was able to resume work an hour after the accident occurred.

A New Hotel.

The hotel Danphy on King Street, which lately became the property of Herbert Estabrook, is being practically rebuilt by him. It is receiving a complete overhauling both inside and out, and another story is to be added. A large new stable has just been erected on the premises. Mr. Estabrook will have his hotel ready for occupancy on May 1st, and anticipates no difficulty in finding a suitable tenant.
