SUCCESSFUL PROVINCIALISTS.

Men from the Lower Provinces Who Have Achieved Political Distinction in Massachusetts.

Six of the members of the new City Government of Boston elected Tuesday, are Provincialists. The list is headed by Hon. Joseph I. Stewart, Republican, re-elected a member of the Board of Aldermen. Mr. Stewart was born in New Brunswick forty-seven years ago and went to Boston at the age of twenty. He is a very successful builder and contractor and has taken an important part in developing the Dorchester district, a large number of residences, apartment houses

and business blocks having been built there by him. Mr. Stewart served several terms in the Legislature and was alderman in 1900. He is a member of many social and fraternal organizations, including the Canadian Club.

John E. Crook, one of the five members of the Common Council included in the list, was born in Halifax, January 1, 1869, and went to the United States about twenty years ago. During the greater part of the time he has resided in the Jamaica Plain district, Boston. Mr. Crook is a brass finisher and is connected with the American Steam Gauge Company.

Henry S. Clark, who like Mr. Crook, is a Republican, is a native of St. John, N. B., and is forty-four years old. He is a builder and has already served one term in the Council.

William A. H. Crowley, another St. John man, was educated in Boston and served last year in the Common Council. He is a clothing cutter.

Edwin T. McKnight, Republican, was born in Kings Co., New Brunswick, about thirty years ago. He is a lawyer and a graduate of the University of N. B. and of Harvard Law School.

Prince Edward Island is represented by Gilbert M. Stalker, Republican. He is forty years old and is in the grocery business. This is the first time he has held political office.

The Provincialist element was also considerable of a factor in the elections in other New England cities. Charles Bruce, Republican, who was re-elected Mayor of Everett, Mass., is a native of Nova Scotia. For a number of years he has taken an active part in politics in Everett.

HARTOPP DIVORCE SUIT.

Much Scandal Evolved—Both Petitions Dismissed

London, Dec. 18.—The Hartopp divorce case, which has been in progress for several weeks, was summed up yesterday with singular lucidity and impartiality by Justice Barnes. The charge was so colorless that the jury were left to their own resources in unravelling the tangled skein of evidence. The trial has been a most discreditable revelation of the morals and manners of smart society in country houses, on racing courses, and in the hunting fields. Sir Charles Hartopp, a racing baronet, and his wife, Lady Hartopp, brought their servants into court to prove charges and counter-charges against each other, with the aid of fashionable acquaintances, private detectives, cabmen, spies and eavesdroppers. While the jury were warned from the bench that they were not censors to pass criticism upon the mode of life of people without other employment than the pursuit of their own pleasures, public moralists go outside the direct issues and find in the case lamentable evidence of the decadence of London society.

The jury dismissed both petitions for divorce, virtually deciding that neither charge nor counter-charge had been proved, and that both contestants must pay immense law bills and get on as best they can without relief from court.

TO HELP CHAMBERLAIN.

Botha Explains Abandonment of American Trip.

New York, Dec. 18.—Gen. Louis Botha, writing to Theodore M. Banta, from Brussels, under date of Dec. 3, in reply to a letter from the committee of the trustees of the Holland Society to General Botha, Dewet and Delarey, tendering the courtesies of the society and co-operation during their contemplated visit to this country, says:—"You will no doubt be aware that Mr. Chamberlain has left for South Africa. He has promised to investigate matters there, and to give our people further pecuniary assistance if he finds that necessary. For this reason we shall not at present visit America, as we are returning to South Africa, because we consider that we shall be better serving our people to meet Mr. Chamberlain there, and personally help to let him see how great the need is in our devastated country, by giving him all possible information there. When we have done this we propose to go to America, and will then take the liberty of informing you further about our visit. I regret to see that so many of our fellow-countrymen are already busy trying to raise funds in America. I wish to remark that no one there represents our people, nor is there on any mission from our people or in any way connected with us and our mission."

NEW ROYAL TRAIN, A POEM AWHEEL.

London, Dec. 18.—The new royal train, which was used for the first time this week by the King and Queen on their journey to Gopsall Park, where they are now the guests of Lord and Lady Howe, is said to have cost \$300,000. It was built by the London and Northwestern Company, and is said to be the most luxurious and beautifully appointed in the world.

There are two saloons, each measuring sixty feet in length, three saloons for the suite and two brake vans, each fifty feet long. The whole train weighs 210 tons and is 385 feet long.

The furnishings of the various apartments are artistic in the extreme. Delicately shaded electric lamps suggest a luxurious drawing room rather than a railway coach. In the King's smoking room, which is furnished in mahogany and inlaid with rosewood and satinwood, the comfortable lounge chairs are of green leather and the curtains and carpets harmonize with the chairs. In a much lighter tone of green, with white enamel and satinwood furniture, inlaid with ivory, is the King's day compartment. Even the handles of the ventilators in this and the other saloons are works of art in silver. There are provided in the King's saloon electric fans and heaters and silver electric cigar lighters.

In the Queen's bedroom the predominating color is rose pink, against which the bed, with its silver plate fittings, makes a beautiful effect. Electric lamps peep out from unexpected corners and from under folds of silk, while the brocades in the boudoir combine pale blue with another shade of pink.

All the Queen's rooms, including a dressing room on each side of the bedroom, are in white enamel. The King's bed and dressing rooms are also in white enamel, with finely silver-plated fittings. But the upholstery is generally of a soft green shade.
