

ROSS WILL FIGHT IT OUT.

Ontario Premier Expects to Retain Power

NOTWITHSTANDING HIS NARROW MAJORITY IN THE HOUSE.

Newmarket, Ont., Oct. 8.—Premier Ross, speaking at the celebration in honor of Hon. E. J. Davis on Saturday, referred to the present Ontario situation as follows: "Now, we have pressed through the election, and our opponents say my majority is small and that I should resign. I am not called upon by usage in England or in Canada to resign, and I may tell you in confidence that I have no intention of resigning. Put it antithetically, I am resigned to my small majority. I am going to put up with it until it swells a little larger. I think it will grow, as my friend has said. I believe if the elections were fought over again it would be very much larger than it is. Some men have repented of their bad votes in the last election, and are only waiting for the chance to bring forth fruits meet for repentance, and such fruits will be to change their vote. I hope we will give some of them opportunity. Then our opponents say we are anxious to form a coalition. The Toronto Globe on its own authority said, or rather appeared to argue, that a coalition might be to the advantage of the country. I am speaking for the Liberal party, and for the time being as the leader of the Liberal party in the Province of Ontario, and I want you to understand that I have confidence that the Liberal party has within its own ranks the capacity and the power to carry on the government of this country for some time longer. I think we have the men, I think we have the votes. I think we will have a majority amply sufficient when the house meets, and I am not going to admit for one moment that we are not capable of governing the country ourselves. That is my position.

"Well then," they say, if you will not resign or form a coalition, what are you going to do? Well, we are just going to fight. That is all we are going to do. (Cheers.) I say again fight, and I want you to spell that word over deliberately, so that you will understand its full significance. Every letter of the word suggests the intensity of our earnestness. We believe we still hold and shall continue to hold a majority of seats in Parliament, and with a little more of that determination and energy with which the joy of battle inspires every advocate of a good cause, we still hope to carry on the government of the country as we have done for the past thirty years. We are going to the election courts, and we will have our little seances there, and should constituencies be opened that we think we ought to contest, we will contest these constituencies.

"That is our position. The Liberal party is in power. So far as I am concerned, it is going to remain in power until there is a majority of the house against us. (Cheers.) Very well, then, we will look on and see how the other fellows get on—(laughter)—and you need not worry yourselves as to that matter, for I do not think if they do get in they would get on very well or for very long.

THE GLOBE'S COMMENTS.

The Toronto Globe in commenting on Hon. G. W. Ross' speech at Newmarket, says:

"At present the only question before the people of Ontario is good administration. We believe the province is now being well administered, but if the Ministers are to continue to give efficient service they must have a working majority in the legislature. If the present Ministry can obtain such a majority by the will of the people, the conditions of good government will be fulfilled. If not, a working majority must be obtained for some ministry, and we do not care whether it is called coalition or by any other name so long as the province is well governed.

In the meantime Mr. Ross says his policy is simply 'Fight,' and his pluck and resolution are to be admired. Only

it is incumbent on all those who applaud his courage to support him with deeds. It will be useless to applaud and then to leave him with a majority so small as to keep him and his colleagues in continual anxiety as to their support in the Legislature. What we say is, it is absolutely necessary that there shall not be a deadlock. If that can be avoided by strengthening Mr. Ross, so much the better. We see no possible Whitney combination that will give the province as good an administration as it now enjoys. But there is no use in saying 'No coalition' unless the people are prepared to give Mr. Ross the support that will make him independent of any such measure."

GENERAL FIGHTS JOURNALIST.

Paris, October 8.—The death of Emile Zola was the indirect cause of a duel yesterday between General Percin, chief of the Cabinet of the Minister of War, and Gaston Pollonaire, a well-known Nationalist writer, who was responsible for the statement that General Percin met Dreyfus at Zola's late residence and shook hands with him. The general, in his letter, replying to the question of Count Boni de Castellane, on this subject, described M. Pollonaire as a "renegade Jew," and also told the count he did not admit the latter had any right to judge his actions. M. Pollonaire then challenged General Percin, and they fought with swords near St Cloud yesterday afternoon. The general was slightly wounded in the hand.

The duel lasted twenty-five minutes and both men fought vigorously. M. Pollonaire was pricked in the arm in the first encounter. Gen. Percin's sword broke in the fifth round. The general received his wound in the hand in the seventh encounter. A vein and a tendon were severed. The doctors then stopped the duel.

New York, Oct. 7.—The Herald has the following:

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 4.—Robert McWade, United States Consul at Canton, who arrived here from China, bound to Washington, D. C., carries with him the full particulars of a discovery for the cure of leprosy. Dr. Razlag, of Vienna, who was for some time connected with the United States Army Medical Corps in the Philippines, made the discovery, and experiments conducted by him at Canton have proved the efficiency of the cure. Mr. McWade said:—"I have with me full particulars, from the doctor himself, describing the discovery, and the results. Fourteen cases were treated with success by him at Canton. Dr. Razlag was able to get a number of typical cases where the disease had been well advanced. With fourteen patients under constant treatment he developed his discovery. In each case under his treatment the disease soon manifested an improvement, and in one of the worst cases, that of a Chinese coolie, between thirty and forty years old, the advancement was very marked. This man, who had been a powerful coolie, was bent with paralysis as the result of the inroads of leprosy. He was obliged to walk on all-fours. As a result of the treatment this man is now as straight as any of his fellow-men, and can carry as heavy a load as he ever could. The result has been wonderful in this case, for the man, who was a cripple, helpless and scarcely able to move, has completely recovered."

HIS ACCOUNTS WERE SHORT.

Toronto, Oct. 8.—Sidney F. Gordon, a clerk in the employ of the G. T. T., who lives at 4 Grifford street, was arrested last night by Detective Forrest and G.T.R. Detective Day on a charge of stealing \$29.27 from the company on September 27. Gordon had been employed by the G. T. R. for a number of years, and was in charge of the cash at the local freight office in the Union Station.

A short time ago a suspicion arose that something was wrong, and another clerk was questioned. The latter stated that Gordon had recently approached him with a proposition, whereby they could falsify the books and keep the matter secret. This could only have been done with the co-operation of both men. When this was learned on Thursday last Gordon was suspended and his books were examined. Nothing wrong was found until yesterday, when the books revealed the disappearance of \$29.27 on September 27. A warrant for Gordon's arrest was then immediately issued. It was at first feared that he had left the city, as he had been seen on the station platform on Thursday afternoon. He was arrested, however, when leaving a street car near his boarding house last night. A further search is being made of the books.

Gordon is a married man. His brother-in-law last night endeavored to obtain bail for him, but was unsuccessful.
