AN UNHOLY ALLIANCE.

The Globe and the Sun are united in their plan of campaign against the local government—an unholy alliance formed for a selfish purpose, and unworthy of public confidence.

Previous to the last election both these newspapers, the one professing to be Liberal, the other Tory, were most solicitous for running local contests on Dominion party lines. Mr. Foster and the Sun organized the Moncton convention which by resolution commanded all Conservatives to break with the local government and rush to the assistance of Dr. Stockton and Mr. Hazen, who at that time were forming a new administration on paper. The Tory chiefs from the various constituencies were summoned to Moncton to confer with their great leader Foster, who hoped by consolidating his party in the then pending local elections, to sweep this province when the federal contest was called on. But not all the prominent Conservatives of New Brunswick responded to the call of the party leaders. Quite a large number of them absolutely refused to be lashed into line against the local government which they had supported for years, and the convention, while fairly representative of the Conservative machine of which the Sun turns the crank, utterly failed in its main object, and when the elections came on Mr. Foster and his plan to turn the government out were frustrated, ignobly, overwhelmingly defeated, and in the federal election which followed later, the man who conceived the new plan of campaign against Mr. Emmerson, was driven out of public life by the votes of the electors of St. John.

While the Moncton convention scheme, directed against the Liberal party, was being hatched by Mr. Foster and his co-workers, the Globe was giving its countenance and assistance to the Conservatives by advocating the drawing of federal party lines in the local elections. Mr. Emmerson, who is as true and faithful a Liberal as ever sat in Parliament, had all the opposition the Globe could give in the local contest of 1899, the alleged Liberal newspaper working hand in hand with those who were seeking to destroy the Liberal party in this province by the plan of first securing control of the local administration.

The Moncton convention scheme failed—miserably failed, as everybody knows, and Dr. Stockton and his party which had the support of the Sun and Globe, were annihilated at the polls, only five opposition candidates surviving the shock of battle.

It was after this that the Sun and Globe discovered that it was all a mistake running the election on Dominion issues. The people, they are now declaring, pronounced against it—against the Moncton conspiracy and the unholy alliance of the Grit and Tory newspapers, and now these publications are addressing labored and hypercritical articles to their readers, appealing to Liberals and Tories alike to withdraw their allegiance from the local government, but the appeal will be in vain. The Sun and the Tory machine do not like Mr. Tweedie, because he refused to be dragged into the Moncton convention, and a few months after that precious meeting, no less a Tory light than Sir Charles Topper formally read Mr. Tweedie out of the party. The Globe does not like Mr. Tweedie because he was once a Conservative, and in former years happened to be a member of a government which failed to ad-

vised by one high up in the Globe sanctum in certain matters of patronage in St. John. The Sun's opposition to Mr. Tweedie is dictated by the Conservative machine—or rather the wreck of it that is left, the Globe's animosity is largely personal, so that the public is not likely to be influenced by an alliance that is neither natural nor powerful, a combination based on narrow notions, and conducted on one side at least, from purely personal motives.

Hon. H. T. Duff of the Quebec government, just returned from London, says that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has made a fine impression, and his eloquence was the sensation of London. The English style of oratory differs from ours, and an English speaker goes quietly along in a groove, seldom becoming enthusiastic, and never permitting himself flights of eloquence. Though Sir Wilfrid spoke only fifteen minutes at the Canadian Club dinner, he completely eclipsed them all, and wherever he spoke the attention was close and the applause tremendous.

Mr. Chamberlain is so far recovered from the effects of his accident that he has resumed his place in the House of Commons, and has made a speech in which he declared that the government has no wish that the Boers should break with their old traditions. "We desire," says Mr. Chamberlain, "that they should preserve all the best characteristics of their race, and hope they will shake hands with us, thus securing prosperity in South Africa under the flag which protects different religions."

Senator Thompson, Dr. Atherton and W. T. Whitehead, M.P.P., who leave Fredericton this evening to join Hon. A. G. Blair in a trip to England, will scarcely be in time for the coronation, but the friends of the four gentlemen will follow them with good wishes for a pleasant journey and a safe return.

An Ottawa despatch says that it is believed Hon. A. G. Blair's visit to England is due to a summons from Sir Wilfrid Laurier to aid the Canadian ministers in reaching a decision on the fast steamship line question.

The Sun when cornered in a political argument invariably shouts "You're another." It is worthy of note that the Sun even when subsidized by the government to the extent of \$12,000 was unable to avoid a visit from the sheriff.

Londoners are lionizing General Lucas Meyer, late of the Boer army. He has been dined by Lords Rothschild and Roberts, and is indeed deluged with invitations to other social festivities.

The Balfour government received a black eye in the North Leeds election, where a Conservative majority of 2,517 in 1900 was converted into a minority of 758.
