OUR CANADIAN HEROES.

Further details of the sanguinary battle at Hart's River show that the Canadian troops bore the brunt of the Boer attack, and finally repelled it and saved the day for the British forces. There were two thousand Boers engaged and they fought with desperation. The Canadians were in the front rank and displayed conspicuous bravery, one party fighting not 1 every man was either killed or wounded, the last man, although mortally wounded, emptying his cartridge belt at the enemy and then breaking his rifle. The battle lasted three hours.

London newspapers are loud in their praises of Canadian bravery. The London Telegraph heads its accounts, "Canadian Valor," the Daily Chronicle, "Splendid Canadian Valor," the Standard, "Gallantry of the Globe," "Bravery of the Canadians," and the Westminster Gazette, "Death Rather than Surrender."

Mr. Chamberlain sends his congratulations to Canada, and the whole civilized world rings with the story of our gallant sons' heroism.

Never can their glory fade; no wild charge they made; they simply stood up to the enemy and died in defence of the empire, but not before they had repelled the foe and helped to win victory.

There is mourning in Canadian homes for those who perished, but how noble was death under the circumstances. There is honest, patriotic pride in the fact that Canada has given such service to the fatherland.

FOURTH CANADIAN CONTINGENT.

The militia department has already commenced arrangements for the mobilization of 2,000 men for the fourth Canadian contingent which will be despatched from Halifax within the next few weeks, for South Africa. The contingent will be made up of three regiments, recruited one half west of Lake Superior in Manitoba, Northwest and British Columbia and the other half from Ontario and the maritime provinces. About one-quarter of the latter will be drawn from Ontario. The conditions of the enlistment will be exactly the same as the last contingent. The men will receive yeomanry pay and the officers imperial cavalry pay. The imperial war office will supply the transport ships, arms, ammunition and transport supplies. The contingent will be outfitted and equipped by the Canadian government, Britain, to pay the cost. The regiments will be mobilized at Halifax and shipped at intervals of two weeks in order that the Halifax accommodation may not be overcrowded at any time.

Canada will send 500 officers and men from the militia forces to the coronation, and they will be selected from all over the Dominion, and represent all arms of the service. The contingent will sail from Quebec June 7, and leave for home July 3.

Admiral Drury who is a native of Fredericton and has numerous relatives here, is mentioned as the probable successor of Rear Admiral Rosanquet in the command of the East Indian Station. He is regarded as an officer of exceptional merit.

Kruger's eldest son and twenty-four other relatives of the ex-president bearing his name have sworn allegiance to Great Britain.

THE HALIFAX STRIKE.

Extending to Other Classes of Workmen.

Halifax, April 7.—The Longshoremen's strike is extending to the Coal Workers Union, and the latter say they will not coal steamers on which non union Longshoremen are working. Coopers and wharf hands take a similar stand. At the I. C. R. pier this morning some Sheet Harbor men brought here to load steamers decided to join the strikers and Stewackie men who arrived later followed suit. Saturday afternoon the stevedores proposed twenty and twenty-five cents per hour day and night respectively, but the offer was refused. There is no violence or disorder. Some steamers are being loaded and unloaded by colored men.

ARRIVAL OF MAIL STEAMER.

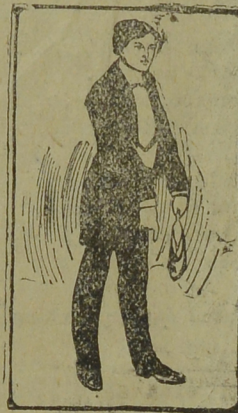
