

THE THISTLES BEATEN.

St. John's Crack Curlers Taken into Camp by the Fredericton Men.

The St. John Thistles with their reputation of beating almost everything that comes in their way, with their Quebec laurels still trailing for public admiration, were soundly defeated by the Fredericton club yesterday, the home team winning in three of the four rinks, and beating their opponents out with a majority of twenty points.

In the afternoon play R. F. Randolph, faced Parson Raymond and gave him a terrific pounding, 21 to 9. The Fredericton players struck a fast pace early in the game and were never headed. Randolph took nearly everything he played for, and had excellent support from his men.

On the other side Rutter wrestled with Fred Shaw, the Thistles' crack skip, and would have downed him handily had the Fredericton support been up to the standard. First and second put up a fair game but the mate was having an off day, and Shaw finished four ahead, 20 to 16.

The evening rinks lined up at 8.15, Loggie vs McClelland and Hawthorn vs Robinson. The games were interesting but not exciting. Loggie never allowed his opponent to get dangerously near him, and finished nine ahead—20 to 11.

Hawthorn played a phenomenal game and his men gave him fine support. The Thistle play on this rink was the best of the day on their side, but they never once headed the Fredericton men, although early in the game the scores tied at 4. Hawthorn finished three points ahead, 17 to 14.

The ice was not in good condition. It was smooth but sticky, the stones taking too much curl. It was almost impossible to lay a guard.

There were lots of spectators both afternoon and evening, and they liberally applauded good plays on both sides. At the conclusion of the match the visitors were lunched in the rink ante-room, Caterer Hatt putting up a toothsome spread and there was a round of toasts and speeches.

FATAL RIOTING.

Many Persons Killed in Spain—Troops Compelled to Fire on The Mobs.

London, Feb 21.—A message to the Exchange Telegraph Co from Barcelona says a fierce battle has been fought between the troops and rioters in a suburb of Barcelona. Before the engagement the cavalry and infantry had been posted in the most dangerous points and a field battery located on the place from which the guns could sweep the surrounding streets. When the final clash with the troops oc-

curring the artillery was brought into action and raked street after street. The rioters engaged the batteries at close range but were quickly driven off. It is reported that 500 persons were killed and wounded on both sides. The entire neighborhood was wrecked by the shells. The ruins caught fire and this completed the destruction.

Martial law has been proclaimed at Manresa, about 30 miles northwest of Barcelona, and at Saragossa.

The government declines to publish figures of the casualties in the riots of Tuesday and Wednesday. It is inferred from private information that 40 persons were killed and 200 wounded and that 500 arrests have been made. All persons who were slightly wounded were concealed by their friends in order to avoid prosecution.

Women took a prominent share in the riots and were more violent than the men.

LIBERALS RULE THE SENATE.

House of Commons got into Supply—Some Government Bills.

Ottawa, Feb. 21.—When Hon. Mr. Sifton entered the house yesterday afternoon after returning from the victory in Lisgar he was accorded an enthusiastic reception.

The house went into supply and took up the estimates of civil government and adjourned at 6 o'clock.

The minister of justice gives notice of three ministerial measures. One is to amend the provisions with respect to tolls of the act of 1881 relating to the C. P. R. A second is to ratify the agreement between the government and the Marconi Wireless Telegraphy Company. The third relates to the regina law library.

For the first time in the history of the senate the Liberals were able yesterday to have their own way, and consequently a committee was appointed with a Liberal majority on it to strike the standing committee. The committee is composed of Bowell, Templeman, Ferguson, Dandurand, Miller, Ellis, Loughhead, Jones and Scott, who moved the motion. He said it was framed so as to give the government a majority. The last session, the Conservatives had 40 members on the railway committee and the Liberals 11. On internal economy, there were 25 members, and 6 Liberals.

Sir MacKenzie Bowell complained of politics entering into the senate, and said the Conservatives had 5 majority.

Senator Templeman pointed out that the government represented the people and were responsible for expenditure. The motion carried in division.

A radical measure towards lessening the cost of provincial government and preventing further increase in membership of the house has been introduced by a Liberal member of the Ontario legislature. It proposes to reduce the number of members to 60, the boundaries of electoral districts to be determined in 1903 and in every 10th year by three commissioners chosen by judges of the Supreme Court from among themselves. The assembly now has 93 members.

The critical illness of the Earl of Kimberley, Liberal leader in the House of Lords, is announced.
