## GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson Holds out Hope for  
St. John Valley and Fredericton.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, M.P., who has put up such a stiff fight for the extension of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway to the Maritime Provinces, in an interesting interview with the Moncton Transcript, indicates the probability of the road taking the route through New Brunswick advocated by the Herald.

Mr. Emmerson, in prefacing his observations, says: "The railway, in my opinion will undoubtedly secure its charter in the form reported by the railway committee and its Maritime Province terminus will be at Moncton city. There is no question but that the eastern section will be built to Moncton, providing that government assistance is given to any portion of the road. In other words, should the government subsidize any of the western sections it would be contingent upon the construction and completion of the Eastern section. As Sir Wilfrid Laurier has expressed to the House his opinion that the Grand Trunk Pacific would not be constructed without assistance from the Dominion, therefore it logically follows that the extension of the road to Moncton is practically a certainty, if the government assists the road at all."

Mr. Emmerson continues: "There is of course nothing definitely known as to the route through New Brunswick, but one which has been discussed by those acquainted with the topography of the country, and which seems to be favored by the promoters of the Grand Trunk Pacific charter, is that the eastern section will cross the new bridge at Quebec, and instead, of following the I. C. R. route along the south of the St. Lawrence; it will strike inland and follow the other side of the mountain ridge on the south. The land there is suitable for railway construction, being well settled and without railway communication. It would follow that route down to Connors in Madawaska county, and thence down the valley of the Upper St. John to Centreville, Woodstock, and thence to Fredericton keeping so far on that side of the river. At Fredericton it would cross the bridge and cut across to the coal fields of Queens county, tapping probably the Central Railway at Chipman, and from thence there is an easy route, comparatively inexpensive to construct, stretching for forty miles or so to Moncton, striking this vicinity at or about Berry's Mills."

All this must be very pleasing to the people of Fredericton and the St. John Valley generally, and we trust that Mr. Emmerson's forecast may prove in the main correct. His belief, however, that Moncton will be the terminus of the road must be somewhat shaken by Mr. Blair's declaration in the railway committee that if the New Brunswick extension is built, it must be by the shortest route to St. John, which is two hundred miles nearer the west than any other Atlantic port in Canada.

## FORSAKES THE TORY WIGWAM.

It is announced that Mr. A. M. Belding, the Millicite chieftain, has resigned his position as editor of the St. John Star to accept a similar position with the Evening Times, the new Liberal paper about to be issued in St. John.

We do not know what act of penance and contrition Mr. Belding has performed before being admitted to the Liberal fold, but we should judge that his long association with the Sun and Star would demand considerable heart-searching and purification on his part.

Mr. Belding in his editorial capacity has had a good deal to say about political opportunists, but we trust that none of his conferees of the press will be guilty of reminding our converted brother of his past political sins. Let him come to us humbly, contritely, with a confession of past mistakes on his lips, but let our once erring but converted brother be cordially received. There is room in the Liberal wigwam for even the Millicite brother. "While the lamp holds on to burn," etc.
