Two Sisters Drowned at Richibucto.

TWO BROTHERS ENGULFED IN R. I.

Sailor Fell Over St. John Wharf

A sad drowning accident occurred at the south beach, Richibucto, Kent Co., Saturday evening. Four sisters—two young women and two girls, aged sixteen and twelve respectively, daughters of Marshall Arseneault, of Peter's Mills—started to sail from the south beach to the mainland in a small dory. The dory was upset and all the girls were thrown into the water. There was no assistance at hand, but the eldest of the girls, who is a good swimmer, strove heroically to save her sisters, but two of them were drowned—one of the young women and the youngest girl. The eldest girl herself would no doubt have been drowned but for the assistance of Richard Robichaud, son of Lighthouse Keeper Robichaud, who happened along and assisted in rescuing two of the girls. One of the deceased young women was to have been married July 1st.

Two of the girls worked in a factory on the beach. The other two went to meet them and all went for a sail.

The girls' ages that were drowned are twelve and nineteen. The other two saved are sixteen and twenty. Their bodies were recovered Sunday and Coroner Bourque held an inquest, when a verdict of accidental drowning was rendered.

Boy's Heroism.

Pawtucket, R. I., June 9.—A double drowning of brothers in the Pawtucket, river during a squall last night was of particularly distressing circumstances, as the heroism of one in trying to save his brother cost the second life, and the determination of yet a third brother to recover the two bodies nearly added one more to the death roll. The drowned were: Jone Finneran, aged seventeen; Henry Finneran, aged fourteen.

They were with Edward Finneran, aged sixteen, Thomas Welch, Joseph Welch and James Quinn.

The party was crossing the river in a flat bottomed boat when a squall overturned the craft. Henry Finneran could not swim, and in response to his cries his brother John went to his assistance. In his fight, the younger lad clasped John about the neck, and after a brief struggle both went down. Edward began diving with the idea of bringing the bodies to the surface before it was too late to resuscitate his brothers. Time and again he dove, but without success, and finally, when a rescuing party went out, he was picked up so exhausted that before the shore was reached it was thought he had died. Physicians worked an hour before they were rewarded with signs of returning consciousness. The Welch boys and Quinn reached shore after a hard swim. The body of one of the drowned boys was recovered.

Too Much Whiskey.

John Berry, a seafaring man, single, who hails from Rexton, Kent Co., was drowned at Reed's Point, St. John, last evening.

Berry, who was thirty-one years of age, had left a vessel and was looking for a chance on another, and had been drinking, it is said, during his time ashore.

Saturday night he was seen asleep near the edge of the Reed's Point wharf, and had a bottle with him at the time.

About 6 10 o'clock Berry lost his life. He had been sitting on the cap of the D. A. R. steamship line wharf at Reed's Point in company with two other sailors. F. D. Seely, of Greenwich (N. B.) was standing near the men at the time and says he saw them getting up from the cap of the wharf as if to leave, when suddenly Berry reeled and fell over the wharf backwards.

There was a crash and, running to the edge of the wharf, they could just see the man disappearing in the water. The current was running quite swift down the harbor, it being low tide at the time.

It is thought that in falling over the wharf Berry had struck his head on the guard near the paddle-wheel on the Prince Rupert, which was lying at the wharf, and was either killed or stunned

so that he never came to the surface after sinking.

PENNY SAVINGS BANKS.

Popular Move by the Federal Government.

Ottawa, June 9.—Hon. Mr. Fielding introduced a bill, entitled an act respecting penny banks in the commons yesterday. The object is to encourage thrift among the poorer classes. The banks will not be money making establishments, and with the exception of small sums to meet daily demands all moneys will be deposited in the government savings bank. The government will allow the penny banks 3½ per cent. interest, and the depositors will be paid 3 per cent., the extra half per cent. going to meet the expenses of maintenance. A reserve of \$10,000 will be required, and it is expected that only charitable institutions will operate such banks. Charters will be taken out by letters patent. The amount deposited to the credit of any one person will be limited to \$300. Banks will not be allowed to invest deposits.

INJURED IN EXPLOSION.

Presbyterians are Crowding Vancouver for Annual Church Meeting.

AMERICAN VISITORS TO BE WELCOMED.

Brethren Will See China-town Wonders.

Vancouver, B. C., June 9.—Presbyterians are arriving here in large numbers to attend the first meeting of the General Assembly ever held on the Pacific coast.

The United States Assembly clergymen have come this way home in order to be visitors at the Assembly here, and the gathering consequently takes on an international character.

The sessions will be held in St. Andrew's church and the first meeting will be held tonight.

It is believed that Rev. Dr. Fletcher of Hamilton will be the new moderator. The weather is very warm.

It is said detectives have been engaged to conduct the visiting delegates through Vancouver's China town, including the Joss houses and opium dens.

CONTRACT RENEWED.

But Canada Warned of What May Happen Five Years Hence.

London, June 9.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Austen Chamberlain announced that the contract for the all-British mail route to the far west by way of the Canadian Pacific Railway had been renewed by five years, but that was the utmost limit to which the government could go in helping to secure a fast Trans-Atlantic steamship line. The mails had not reached expectations, and if at the end of five years the Canadian government has not established a fast Atlantic service it was unlikely that Great Britain would renew the contract.

A CHEERFUL PROPHECY.

Lady Henry (Somerset Sees End of the Liquor Traffic.

Geneva, Switzerland, June 9.—Mrs. Lillian Stevens of Portland, Me., presiding at today's session of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, read Lady Henry Somerset's presidential address, in which the absent president predicted that the eventual outcome of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union's fight would be a complete victory over the liquor traffic. She said modern governments were alive to the danger, and referred to the fact that Russia, France and Sweden were strenuously fighting the evil.

OTTAWA'S UNIQUE FUNERAL.

Ottawa, Ont., June 9.—The funeral of the late S. J. Major took place today according to the wishes expressed in his will, except that the sanitary authorities would not permit the remains to be borne to the grave uncoffined.

They were borne on a wonderfully constructed chariot drawn by four black horses, and after the funeral the chariot was burned. Thousands witnessed the funeral.

COLLIDED AT SEA.

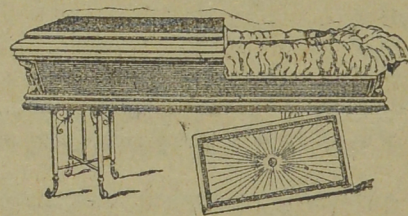
