

A PALACE ON WHEELS

KING EDWARD'S NEW ROYAL TRAIN A MARVEL OF BEAUTY.

The Two Cars Recently Finished for the King and Queen by the London and North Western Railway Have Greatly Pleased Their Majesties—Latest Ideas in Construction, Fitting, Decoration and Furnishing Have Been Here Carried Out.

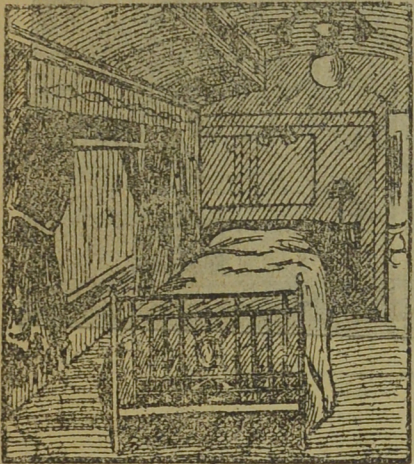
King Edward of England will hereafter travel by rail in his own private car in luxurious fashion. Two cars have just been finished for the use of the King and Queen, by the London and North Western Railway which have greatly pleased Their Majesties.

The royal carriages embody the latest ideas in construction, fitting, decoration and furnishing. There are two saloons, one for the King and one for the Queen. The latter also contains accommodations for the Princess Victoria.

The exteriors of the cars are enamelled in white and chocolate picked out in gold. The interior arrangements are as perfect as they are elaborate.

The King's smoking room is a cozy apartment in mahogany, with fine inlays of rosewood and satinwood. His day compartment is in the colonial style in white enamel. The furniture is in satinwood inlaid with ivory. This room is also treated in green, but of a lighter tone. Electric heaters are introduced. His bed and dressing rooms are also in white enamel, with silver plated fittings, the upholstery generally being of a soft green shade.

In its general arrangement the Queen's saloon is similar to that of the King, with the addition that accommodation is provided for Princess Victoria. All the Queen's rooms are in white enamel, and the



THE KING'S SLEEPING COMPARTMENT. predominating color is blue. Her bedroom is draped in soft pink. Adjoining this is her dressing room.

At the end of each saloon is the attendants' apartment, which is fitted with a seat that can be turned into a bed for night traveling and also with electrical appliances for cooking.

There are two balconies to each saloon, which are fitted with windows so that they can be used as observation cars. These balcony ends are heated by steam, and the two saloons are gangwayed together so as to enable any one to pass from one end of the royal train to the other.

To show the completeness and modernness of the appointments it may be mentioned that the King's saloon is fitted with electric cigars, liars, and each compartment is provided with portable table lamps.

The Redwoods.
