EVIDENCES OF GOOD FAITH.

The Tory outcry that the government has no intention of constructing the eastern section of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, falls flat, in view of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's declarations to the contrary, and from the fact that the government has induced parliament to vote half a million dollars for the survey of the route from Winnipeg to Moncton, and has taken authority to guarantee the bonds of the Quebec bridge, which is to be part of the new transcontinental railway system.

When the item for surveys was before the House of Commons, Mr. Fielding stated that six surveying parties between Moncton and Quebec and fourteen parties between Quebec and Winnipeg had been provided for. The work of construction, he added, would not be commenced until after next session, but the surveying parties would be organized as soon as the appropriation was voted.

Add to these evidences of the government's good faith, the declaration which the government put in the mouth of the governor general at the prorogation of parliament. Lord Minto speaking for his advisers said:

"In view of the flow of emigrants now seeking homes in Manitoba and the Northwest, and of the rapid increase of products requiring facilities to reach the markets of Europe via Canadian ports, and in order to promote the settlement of the great areas of agricultural, mineral and forest lands still untold in the older provinces, my ministers, felt it essential to obtain authority from Parliament for the construction of a second transcontinental railway, the eastern division of which should serve as a common railway highway from Winnipeg to the Maritime ports of Canada.

"It will be the duty of my ministers to provide me with the necessary surveys, so that the work of construction of that portion of the line which extends from Moncton to Winnipeg may be prosecuted with all possible speed."

What sense or reason will there be in Tory politician, Tory newspaper or renegade Liberal sheet, further alleging that the government's promise of the eastern section of the Grand Trunk Pacific is all a blind, and that it will never be constructed, in the face of the declarations we have quoted. The road will be built right through to Moncton, and it is now the business of the people of this particular part of Canada to impress on the government the desirability of constructing the road down the St. John valley to Fredericton.

THE AWARD IN PARLIAMENT.

The Alaska Boundary Award, Lord Alverstone's gift of Canadian territory to the United States, was discussed in the Canadian parliament Friday, and while some plain statements were made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, his language was guarded as becomes a great statesman charged with important responsibilities.

Sir Wilfrid apparently very warmly resents the advantages given the United States, under the Alaska tribunal's decision, but points out the absolute impossibility of Canada withdrawing from the proceedings of the commission after the secret treaty for its constitution had been signed at Washington. To have taken that course would have meant surrender or war, and the Canadian government were not prepared to go to either

length. They were forced before the boundary tribunal after protesting vigorously against its constitution, and have no responsibility for the result so disappointing to this country.

Mr. Borden, the Tory leader shows himself a narrow politician in endeavoring to make political capital out of the award by saddling the blame on the federal government. The Premier has already submitted official correspondence that shows the absurdity of Mr. Borden's contention, and he promises further disclosures in the same line to further strengthen his position, and in spite of any protests that may come from Downing street. The impression conveyed by the correspondence as well as by the Premier's speech is that Canada was treated in an underhand manner by the Imperial authorities, but Sir Wilfrid succeeded in suppressing the indignation he no doubt feels on the subject, and which every self-respecting Canadian feels at the sacrifice of our territory by a jurist whose decision was diplomatic rather than judicial, and whose name will go down in Canadian history, linked with that other sacrificer of Canadian territory, Lord Ashburton, who handed over to our Yankee neighbors one of the richest districts of New Brunswick.

Sir Wilfrid regrets that Canada has not the power to make her own treaties, and that is a concession which will have to be wrung from the Imperial authorities at no distant day. They may delay the change as they did the concession of responsible government to the Canadian provinces, but it will come. Canada has outgrown childhood, and is putting on the strength, energy and valor of manhood, and British Statesmen may as well recognize now and hereafter that we are not mere appendages with interests to be sacrificed at the whim of some noble Lord who may desire to placate another power, rather than to protect and nurture the loyalty and attachment of the Greater Britain.

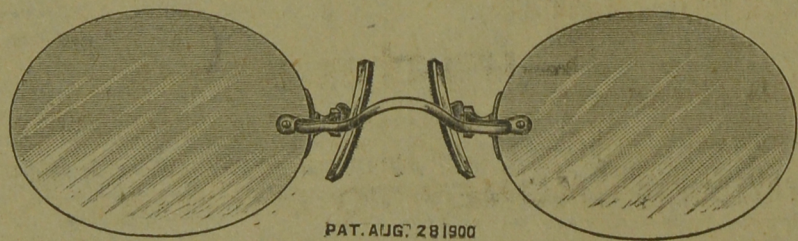
Pleasant Social Function.

SERIOUS AFFRAY.

Midnight Stabbing Match
that May Result in Death.

THREE VICTIMS TAKEN TO HOSPITAL.

Hamilton, Ont., Oct. 24.—A serious stabbing affray occurred shortly before midnight in the vicinity of the Central Market, and as a result, three young men are in the St. Vincent's hospital, suffering from wounds of a more or less serious character. They are William Murray, Toronto, and Thomas Murphy and Joseph Walsh, of this city.

Murray is the most severely wounded of the trio, having a deep cut several inches long in his chest, and it is feared that he may not recover.

Just where or how the row occurred, or who did the stabbing, the police have been unable to ascertain, but it is supposed that the trouble started in a gambling house on York street, kept by Murphy.

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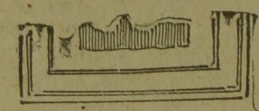

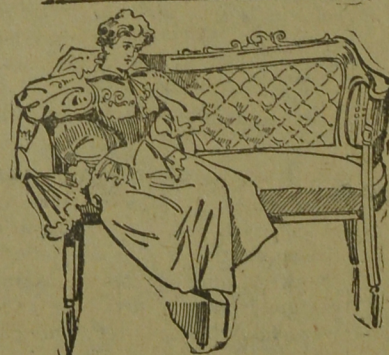
