

A CLEVER CANADIAN.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

London, May 2.—Sir Gilbert Parker, the celebrated Canadian novelist, made an excellent speech in the Commons yesterday in introducing his deceased wife's sister marriage bill. He read a petition supporting it from 75,000 women in Birmingham. Sir Gilbert claimed that the principle of the bill was approved by both Houses of Parliament and both parties, also by the labor unions. He urged the church of England to abandon its prejudice, and to keep even with modern thought in the interests of domestic virtue.

Sir Joseph Laese, Liberal, seconded the resolution.

THE SALONICA OUTRAGE.**Fifty Persons Were Killed in the Ottoman Bank Explosion.**

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Constantinople, May 2.—The acting German consul at Salonica had a narrow escape at the time of the dynamite outrage which destroyed the Ottoman bank there. He was at an adjoining club which was wrecked by the explosion. He was only slightly injured.

He reports that fifty persons were killed or injured as result of the bomb throwing.

Turkish official circles are inclined towards inflicting a sharp lesson on Bulgaria which is considered to be responsible for the outrage but the foreign powers would not permit it.

PROSPECTS OF SETTLEMENT**Strike at Montreal Likely to be Called off To-day.**

Montreal, May 2.—The indications are that the strike of the longshoremen may be settled. At police headquarters it was stated this morning that from information received officials had reason to believe that there had been something like coming together late last evening between the two warring factions, and there would be nothing strange in it if a settlement was reached today.

The officials of the longshoremen's union when seen today at St. Mary's hall, stated that an effort was being made to effect an amicable settlement today.

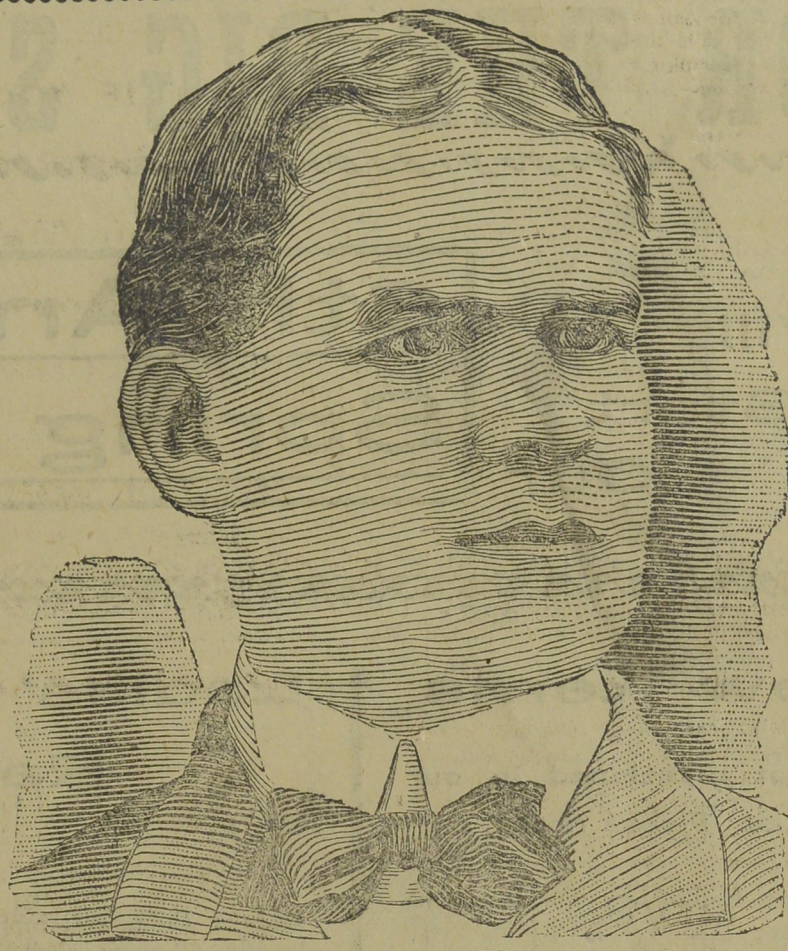
