DR. BAYARD'S OPINION.

Says Mr. Forbes and Mrs. Manzer Did Not Have Smallpox.

Dr. William Bayard of St. John is in the city today, having come up from St. John at the request of H. H. McNally to examine the three members of the family of George Robertson of Marysville who have been suffering for several days from a form of rash. After making a diagnosis of the cases this morning he pronounced them chicken pox.

Dr. Bayard also made an examination of Mr. Forbes of Gibson, recently under quarantine for smallpox, and also Mrs. Manzer of Marysville, who was treated for the disease last summer. He expressed the opinion that neither of them had suffered from smallpox, one of his reasons for arriving at this conclusion being that both had recently been successfully vaccinated by Dr. McNally. The doctor also examined Mrs. Long of Marysville, a recent smallpox patient, and expressed the opinion that her ailment had not apparently been genuine smallpox.

Dr. Bayard while here is the guest of Dr. McNally, Brunswick street.

Boy Badly Injured.

The eight year old son of Charles McCordick, was knocked down and run over by a team near his home on King street, Saturday afternoon, sustaining quite serious injuries. It appears the little fellow was playing in the middle of the street when the mishap occurred, and the team which ran over him belonged to a country resident and had been so frightened by the city watering cart that the horses were beyond the control of the driver. Dr. McGrath who was summoned to attend the injured youth, found that he had sustained a fracture of the collar bone, in addition to being badly bruised about the head and body. At last accounts the patient was getting along nicely.

The amount collected in fines at the Fredericton police court during the month of May was \$216. Of this sum \$150 was for Scott Act offences.

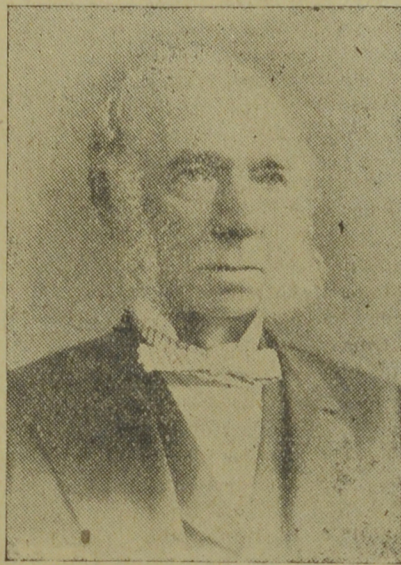

AUDITOR GENERAL BEEK.

Who Has Been Honored by The King.

The announcement that Mr. James S. Beek, the respected auditor general of New Brunswick, had been selected as the one member of the civil service of this province to receive from the King the Imperial service order, came as a very pleasant bit of news to the numerous friends of that worthy gentleman, and he is being overwhelmed with congratulations.

Mr. Beek is a native of Bandon, Co. Cork, Ireland, and was born June 1,



1814, so that today he completed 89 years of life. He came to Fredericton with his parents in 1823, eighty years ago, and has been a resident of this city ever since. He has served as alderman of the city, mayor for three consecutive years, 1859-61, having the honor of receiving the Prince of Wales, now King Edward, when chief magistrate in 1860, was judge of the court of common pleas for several years, and has been auditor general since 1867. In his younger days Mr. Beek took an active part in politics, and has been prominent in temperance and church work, and in every capacity has given active and energetic service.

The Herald joins in the general congratulations on the crowning honor to a useful and well spent life, the recognition by the King of Mr. Beek's long and meritorious public services.

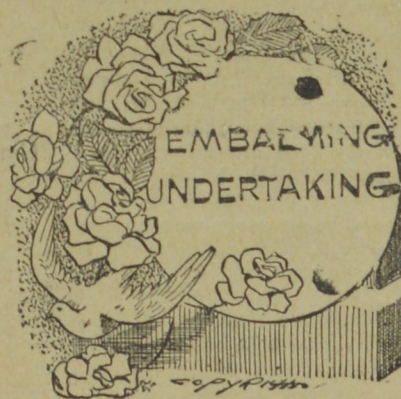
