REDMOND'S AMENDMENT.

London, Feb. 25.—John Redmond today moved an amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne on the land question.

His speech was most conciliatory. He said the amendment was not intended as a hostile demonstration against the government, but as a friendly warning to the ministry that he and his friends believed the government is engaged in framing a great measure of justice and appeasement for Ireland, which in the words of the King's speech, "will complete the abolition of dual ownership of the land."

DESTRUCTIVE STORM.

London, Feb. 25.—A severe gale prevailed here and along the coast last night causing much damage to property.

In this city trees were uprooted and walls of buildings in course of construction were blown down and many houses unroofed.

At Chatham and Dover the railway was blocked for a considerable time by a brick shed blown across the track.

The British steamer Monadnock, bound from Blythe for Boston with a cargo of coal, was driven ashore on the Isle of Man and is believed to be a total loss. Her crew was rescued with much difficulty.
