THE CAMPAIGN.

Successful Government Meetings at Stanley and Boiestown.

Senator Thompson, George W. Allen and John A. Campbell addressed a rousing political meeting in the government interest at Stanley last evening. Dr. Allan Sterling occupied the chair and there was a large gathering of representative electors in attendance. The several speakers were given a good hearing and were heartily applauded as they exploded opposition charges and scored point after point in favor of the government. Stanley will do as well if not better for the government candidates than in the last campaign.

Messrs. R. W. McLellan of this city, George F. Burden, one of the candidates for York, and Robert Murray, barrister of Newcastle, addressed a large political meeting at Boiestown last evening, a number of voters from Bloomfield being in the audience. George Watt, one of the opposition candidates in Northumberland was present and was given part of the time, which he devoted to slanderous personal abuse of Premier Tweedie. His arguments were scattered to the four winds by Messrs. McLellan and Murray. A man named Justus McKay from Bloomfield, tried to break up the meeting, and had to be ejected from the hall by Constable Price.

FROM THE YUKON.

Former Member of Mounted Police Has Returned to His Home.

Frank Boone of St. Marys, who joined the Northwest Mounted Police three years ago, has purchased his discharge from the force and is now visiting his former home. For the past two years Mr. Boone has been stationed at White Horse in the Yukon territory and left there only a few weeks ago. He says that Otto Dever is the only Fredericton boy low

now on that station, but George and Lee Winters, Charles Wright, Frank Aiken and Jack Hanlon, late of this city are with the force at Dawson. Mr. Boone says that very cold weather has been experienced in the Yukon country this winter. On one occasion the thermometer at Dawson registered seventy-two degrees below zero, and at White Horse it got down as low as sixty nine. Frequently during the winter Mr. Boone and other members of the force were out working on the Skagway trail, on which occasions they passed the nights in a tent with the thermometer down below fifty degrees. They kept from freezing by means of a small stove and a number of heavy fur robes, but it was a tough job. Mr. Boone, while glad to be out of the police force, is not tired of the Yukon country, and has made up his mind to go back there about the first of May.

FREDERICTON MAN MARRIED.

Mr. Fine of the Klondike Store Secures a Wife in St. John.

A very pretty wedding, says the Telegraph, took place last evening at the Jewish synagogue, Carleton street, when Annie Jacobson, of St. John, and A. Fine, of Fredericton, were married, Rabbi Segal performing the ceremony.

Wife of Popular Stanley Physician Succumbs to Typhoid Fever.

The news of the death of Mrs. Moore, the estimable wife of Dr. D. R. Moore of Stanley, which occurred at her home at 2 o'clock this morning, is a great shock to her numerous friends.

Mrs. Moore was taken ill two weeks ago, and although naturally a strong woman, declined rapidly, heart failure intervening at the last. She had the faithful attendance of Dr. Mullin in the last stages of the attack, in addition to the ministrations of her husband, and everything possible was done to save her life but without avail.

The deceased lady was a daughter of Mr. John McBean, a well known resident of Nashwaak, and besides her sorrowing husband and parents, is survived by one son about fifteen years old, four brothers and two sisters, one of the latter being Mrs. Williams of Piquette Lake. She was 39 years old and a lady very highly esteemed in her large circle of friends and acquaintances.
