HENRY DEWITT'S DEATH.

Old and Esteemed Resident of Victoria Corner Called Away.

A telegram from Victoria Corner, Carleton County, last evening announced the death at that place yesterday of Mr. Henry DeWitt, a gentleman well and favorably known in this section. No particulars were given, but as he was in good health and able to be about up to a few days ago, it is assumed that his death was quite sudden and unexpected.

The deceased gentleman was a native of Bissville, Suobury county, and carried on lumbering operations in that section for a number of years, with considerable success. On retiring from the business he removed to Fredericton with his family and opened a boarding house on Phoenix Square, which he conducted up to about twelve years ago, when he removed to Victoria Corner. The late Mr. DeWitt made frequent visits to Fredericton, and had a great many friends and acquaintances here who all regret to learn of his demise. He was a man of high character, honest, generous and upright, and to know him was to respect him.

The deceased had reached the advanced age of 85 years and is survived by a widow and four daughters, viz, Mrs. Samuel Boyer, Mrs. Birmingham, Mrs. Shaw and Mrs. Hoyt, all of Victoria Corner. Rev. T. O. Dawitt, Free Baptist clergyman of Hoyt Station, is a brother.

The remains will arrive here by the Gibson train this evening, and will be taken to Long's hotel. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2 30 o'clock with interment at the rural cemetery. Rev. J. A. Rogers will conduct the services, and John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.
