CROCODILE TEARS.

The Sun's solicitude for Mr. Blair's personal happiness is most touching. The Tory organ declares that the ex-minister of railways has been shabbily treated by the Liberal press, since his resignation from the cabinet, but it has no justification for such a statement, and we do not believe Mr. Blair feels any grievance against his Liberal friends of the press. Every Liberal newspaper in the country we believe, expressed sincere regret at Mr. Blair's resignation, and spoke in most complimentary terms of the splendid service he has rendered Canada in the responsible position he has held in the government, and that opinion is still held in the Liberal newspaper offices.

Mr. Blair had a perfect right to resign if he conscientiously disbelieved in the government's railway policy, and he stated his reasons for dissenting in a manly straightforward way. What is bothering the Tory organs is that the ex-minister did not assist the Tory party in its childish efforts to block the G. T. P. railway bill in its progress through parliament, after that body had adopted the preliminary resolution endorsing the project. The Tories made a persistent bid for Mr. Blair's support; they thought he was going to cast aside his allegiance to the Liberal party, and unite with his political enemies to put the Tories in power. Mr. Blair has not done this, but the Tories still have hope that he may take the much desired stand, and that is the reason they are endeavouring to impress him with alleged Liberal ill treatment. The ex-minister however is too old a campaigner and too shrewd a man to be caught by such Tory chaff. He is able to recall the campaigns of slander which the Tory newspapers, especially the Sun, have put up against him in the past, and he knows that the tears which Tory editors are now shedding on his behalf are crocodile effusions. The Tory net is spread to catch Mr. Blair, and if he does not permit himself to be scared in it the men who are sympathizing with him today will be abusing him tomorrow.

ST. JOHN'S EXPORT TRADE.

Some of the St. John people are still whining because a couple of the Allan line steamers will load at Halifax this winter instead of St. John, and blame the government for permitting the Allans to make the change. As a matter of fact a petition was presented from a score of prominent St. John business firms asking the government to relieve the Allans from that part of their contract requiring all their boats to land at St. John, on the ground that outward cargoes could not be obtained there. Even now it is improbable that there will be sufficient freight for the steamships that are scheduled to trade from St. John, yet the people there or some of them who want to prejudice the government, are calling on the authorities to compel the Allans to bring all their boats to St. John.

This looks like an unreasonable proposition. St. John will have all the winter port business this winter that it can handle with the present terminal facilities, and if the city wants to do a larger business these facilities will have to be extended. Who shall undertake that work. It is admitted by everybody that the people of St. John have most liberally contributed towards providing terminal facilities. They have expended a million dollars to that end, and quite naturally feel that any further expenditure

should come from some other source, and it seems only fair that either the C. P. R. or the federal government should aid in the enterprise. St. John is to be one of the national ports of Canada, and the whole country is interested in its development, so that the government could very well co-operate in providing increased terminal facilities. It is also reasonable to demand that the C. P. R. should help in the same line. They are profiting largely as a corporation from the expert business, both in rail and water carriage, and should be willing to put a few hundred thousand dollars into the enterprise of properly equipping St. John for the export trade. The Grand Trunk Railway company have expended millions in providing facilities at Portland, and it is a fair claim that St. John makes for like treatment from the C. P. R.

The Telegraph is unable to understand how the G. T. Pacific railway can come down the St. John valley and yet serve Moncton. The idea we believe, is to cut across the country to Chipman from Fredericton, and then to Moncton and St. John.

Ten million dollars in gold was exported from the Klondyke this year up to the recent close of navigation.

NEWS FROM COLLEGE HILL.

Y. M. C. A. Meeting--Star's Article on U. N. B.--Football Tour, Etc.

A. B. Williams, B. A., travelling secretary of the Y. M. C. A. (Intercollegiate) will address a meeting of the University Y. M. C. A. this evening at the College at 7.30 o'clock on "A College Man's Life."

The Montreal Star of Saturday contains an appreciative sketch of the U. N. B., speaking in high terms of the opening of the college under such auspicious circumstances and with such a large class of freshmen. It refers to the splendid work in the engineering school and the new psychological laboratory course, instituted by Dr. Riley, among the first of its kind in the Maritime Provinces. Accompanying the sketch is an excellent cut of John B. DeLong, former captain of the football team.

The U. N. B. football team leave next week on their annual tour. They will play games with Acadia, Mt. Allison, Dalhousie and probably St. John.

A meeting of the University students was held this morning to discuss the advisability of entering an Intercollegiate Debating League, to be entered in by teams from Mount Allison, Dalhousie and Acadia. After considerable discussion it was decided that it would be better to continue the debates with Mt Allison, which would be more beneficial than entering into the proposed league, which would probably extend over three or four years.

ON THE GRIDIRON.

The city football team are negotiating with the Halifax Wanderers for a game here, and it is possible the Nova Scotia hostlers may come next week. Their terms are high, a guarantee of \$225.

The city team has also been in communication with the Mount Allison team who play the U. N. B. here, Friday, asking for a game Saturday, but it was declined, on the ground that Mount Allison hadn't the time. In the meantime it is announced that Mount Allison is to play an intermediate St. John team Saturday. The city team saw this announcement and urged the Sackville players to reconsider their decision not to play here, to play a team in their class, in reply to which Mr. N. P. McLeod received the following curt message:

"Can't play on Saturday; will play whom we please. (Sgd.) HUME."

The second team of the U. N. B. and the Rothesay Collegiate team are to play here on Friday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock.

The Mount Allison team will arrive on Friday and is to play the U. N. B. in the afternoon. The game will be called at 3.45 o'clock and not 3 as stated on the posters.

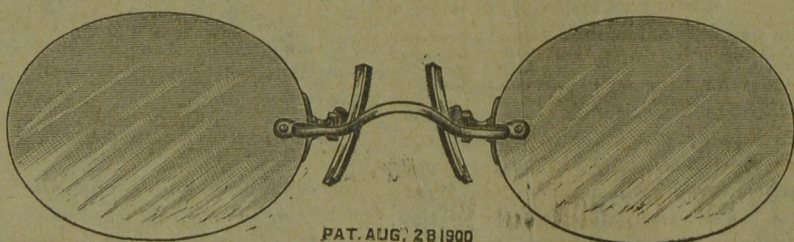
