

CANADIAN BRIDGE MEN.

Are Being Cordially Entertained at St. John.

St. John, Oct. 27.—In a special train of eight cars the Engineers and Bridge Builders Association of Canada, arrived in this city this forenoon and were met at the depot by a delegation from the Board of Trade and other citizens.

After the visitors had been taken to a hotel, they boarded the ocean going tug, Lord Kitchener, and were given a trip around the harbor and up through the falls. The day is bleak and cold, with a generous sprinkling of snow, but the visitors do not seem to mind the inclemency of the weather.

ASSASSINATED.

Head of Armenian Revolutionary Society Struck Down in England.

London, Oct. 27.—St. Matol Sagouni, president of the Armenian revolutionary society in London, was murdered in a suburb of Nunhead, last night.

The crime has aroused a sensation, as it has every appearance of a political character and has been preceded by assassination of other officials of the branches of the same society on the continent.

THREE MEN KILLED.

HUNG UP IN YUKON.

SHOT HIS SISTER.

Another Youth who did not Know Gun was Loaded.

Hardwick, Vt., Oct. 27.—Flora Porter, the 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Porter of Walden, was unintentionally shot by her younger brother yesterday, dying fifteen minutes later. The girl was handling an air gun which she playfully pointed in the direction of her brother, exclaiming as she did so, "I will shoot you." A loaded rifle, the property of the hired man in the family, was resting against a house nearby, and the boy, catching the spirit of his sister's fun, seized this weapon and pointing it at his sister, answered, "I will shoot you too." As he spoke the rifle was accidentally discharged, the bullet entering the body of the girl. Her brother said that he did not suppose that the gun was loaded.

DOWIE THE REVEALER.

Tells of His Own Origin to a New York Audience.

New York, Oct. 27.—In a broken voice with tears streaming down his face and his body shaking with the most powerful emotion, John Alexander Dowie stood on the platform in Madison Square Garden last night before an audience of ten thousand persons and announced that in truth he was not the son of John Murray Dowie, of Essex, Iowa, from whom he takes his patronymic, but that his father was a British army officer of high family by a "Scotch marriage." He heaped villification and denunciation upon John Murray Dowie, who, he declared, had made his mother believe her marriage to Dowie's father was shameful, and the army officer having been taken away by his relatives, his mother in the first flush of her shame had sought to give her son a name by marrying John Murray Dowie.

The revelation was made at the end of an hour's tirade against the press of this city.
