

BOY SUICIDED

Rather Than Face Operation on His Eyes.

BLEW HIS HEAD OFF WITH DYNAMITE CARTRIDGE.

Suicide Arranged With Deliberateness.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Glen Falls, N. Y., Nov. 20.—Paul Royster Millington, a twelve year old boy, living at Riverside, has committed suicide with a dynamite cartridge. The lad had long been troubled with his eyes, and last summer underwent an operation at the Albany Hospital. When told by his father that a second operation was necessary, and that he would have to return at once to Albany, he cried: "I'd rather die than go to the hospital again. I won't go, I'll kill myself."

The boy had said this before, and the father paid little attention to his threat. A few minutes later the household was startled by a heavy explosion. Mr. Millington hurried to the barnyard, and then to the field in the rear. There he found his son dead. The boy had procured a dynamite cartridge and fuse, and going to the rear of the barn had placed the explosive on a rock. Then he lighted the fuse, and taking his stand beside the rock with his head close to the cartridge awaited death. The back of the boy's head was blown off, and particles of the brain and pieces of bones were scattered for fifty feet.

ON PRIVATE BUSINESS.

BANKER RETIRING.

Mr. F. H. Arnaud Severing His Connection With the Royal Bank.

Halifax, Nov. 20.—It is announced that Mr. F. H. Arnaud, at present manager of the Royal Bank at St. John, and recently offered the position of secretary to the Board of Directors in this city, has decided to retire permanently from the Bank's service, and that his resignation is already in the hands of the Directors.

Mr. Arnaud has been in the Bank's service for thirty years, and will be entitled to a retiring allowance of \$2,000 per annum.

NO ADVANCE THIS YEAR.

SNOWBOUND SETTLERS

In Imminent Danger of Starvation.

Missoula, Mont., Nov. 20.—Word has been received from the Trout Creek district that there are several parties of emigrants along the Spokane road, in the west of (Missoula county,) snow-bound and on the verge of starvation. In one party near the Idaho border is a family of five, snowed up and without provisions or money. The family is living in an eight foot tent, with the snow up to the wagon bed, unable to get out or secure food for the stock.

Three other emigrant parties are reported along the trail snowed up in the passes, and all in a precarious condition. Efforts are being made to send out relief parties.

A BIG WILL PROBATED

Hon Alexander Manning Disposed of a Million Dollar Estate

Toronto, Nov. 20.—The will of the late Alexander Manning ex-mayor of this city, was filed for probate today. It disposes of an estate valued at \$976,686, but a portion of the estate is subject to mortgage upon which there is due \$117,180. The will provides that the estate shall be distributed by the trustees until expiry of ten years from death of the testator, except such annuities to the son, Percy Manning, and daughter, Mrs. Hume Blake, as the executors may decide upon. The bulk of the estate goes to these two, the only surviving children.

WHIRLED TO DEATH.

Awful Fate of a Chatham Man.

Chatham, Ont., Nov. 20.—Geo. Yates, engineer of the Wallaceburg Glass Works, died last night from injuries received a few hours before. While lacing the belt that drives the dynamo he was drawn in and whirled around the shaft. His left arm was almost torn off at the elbow. He also received a compound fracture of the upper part of the arm, and internal injuries. Mr. Yates was 50 years of age, and leaves a wife and two small children at home, and two daughters and a grownup son in Michigan.

AIRSHIP EXPLODED.

Paris, Nov. 20.—The Lebaudi airship, on descending today, near the ballooning ground at Noudon, struck a tree and blew up.

The airship was completely destroyed, but the occupants, a pilot and an engineer, were uninjured. M. Lebaudi was not on board.

Montreal, Nov. 20.—The steamer Toronto of the Inland and Ocean Navigation Co., seventeen days out from Newcastle, about which some apprehension was felt, was this morning reported in the Gulf.
