BEAR ISLAND.

(Special Correspondence to the Herald.)

April 10.—The sugar makers are about through with their business, and have had a very good season, although the sudden storms that came so frequently were rather a drawback, also the sudden cold snap a few days ago, which found the sap kettles full of water which froze solid Saturday night, Sunday and Sunday night, causing many of the kettles to burst.

Quite a number of the young men have gone stream driving, most of them going to Houlton, Me., there hire for the different streams and brooks in the northern and eastern part of Maine.

Although the river has been quite free of ice the long looked for Steamer Aberdeen did not make its appearance until yesterday. We need a railroad very much along the river, as it is almost impossible to get anything to market or from the city to this place for at least a month or more in the spring and fall, and the steamer although a great accommodation runs but a short time each season.

The ice left us very quietly this season and the snow very early much sooner than expected and caught many who had hauling to do with it not done.

Gordon Grant had about 500 hemlock logs left in the yards, and the Hawkshaw folks had a lot of bark left in the woods which they intended hauling on the ice but it gave out too soon. As it was Lewis Hueetis lost a fine horse by breaking through the ice near Coac Islands, four horses broke through, they succeeded in getting three out, the other chilled and drowned.

The Jordans are very busy getting their mill ready for sawing, and expect to have it going in a few days.

There has been quite a lot of sickness, in the way of colds, etc.

We are sorry to hear that Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Elliot of this place lost their bright little boy from congestion or cold settling on his lungs. He was about one year old.
