

WENT TO HIS DEATH

Careless Engineer on Cape Breton Railway

RAN HIS ENGINE THROUGH AN OPEN DRAWBRIDGE.

Sydney, N. S., April 14.—A serious accident occurred this morning at Mira Gut.

Engine, 62 a hundred and ten ton machine in charge of Engineer Jas. Parsons and Fireman Dickson was coming up from Louisburg with twenty empty cars.

The drawbridge at Mira Gut was open and a flag was out, but was not noticed by the driver until too close to stop.

The fireman jumped, but Parsons went down with his engine into about twenty feet of water, meeting instant death. His body was recovered soon after. He was 55 years old and leaves a wife and family at Louisburg. He belonged to Montreal.
