

SENATOR'S DEATH.

Hon. A. H. Gilmor Expired Suddenly on the Train

EN ROUTE TO HIS PARLIAMENTARY DUTIES AT OTTAWA.

A Long and Honorable Public Career.

Hon. Arthur Hill Gilmor of St. George, Charlotte county, a Liberal member of the senate of Canada, died last night in his berth in a Pullman just as the C. P. R. express westward was pulling out of Mattawamkeag.

Senator Gilmor was on his way to Ottawa to attend to his parliamentary duties, and was apparently in his usual health, and chatted pleasantly with his fellow-passengers. Mr. F. B. Carvell, ex-M. P. who arrived here last night from Woodstock, told a Herald representative of meeting the Senator at McAdam, just before he boarded the Pacific express for the federal capital. Mr. Carvell says he never saw the Senator in better spirits. He spoke of his intention to return to St. George in a few weeks to look after seeding operations on his farm, and was as bright and hopeful as a man many years his junior might be. Mr. Carvell, it is needless to say, was greatly shocked in taking up the morning paper to read of Senator Gilmor's awfully sudden death.

The deceased gentleman just before retiring for the night complained of feeling unwell, and a few moments later sprang from his berth. A lady passenger saw him and became alarmed. She called the porter who found the senator had succeeded in regaining his berth, but was dead. Heart disease was undoubtedly the cause of death.

Supt. Osborne, of the C. P. R., who was on board the train, had the dead Senator's body removed to his private car and took it through to Montreal, where the deceased's two sons, Daniel and Percy H. reside and where he was to have been joined by Mrs. Gilmor.

The Late Senator's Career.

Hon. A. H. Gilmore was a native of St. George, Charlotte Co., and was seventy-nine years old March 12th last. He first entered political life in 1854 as one of the representatives of Charlotte in the House of Assembly and sat continuously in that body until 1866, when he was defeated on the confederation question. He was provincial secretary in the Sir Albert J. Smith government in 1865. He contested Charlotte county unsuccessfully for the House of Commons in the general elections of 1872, but was returned in 1874-78 82-87-91, and was defeated in 1896 by G. W. Ganong, the present M. P. for Charlotte.

He was called to the Senate April 2, 1900, and was chairman of the Canadian commission for the Paris Exposition the same year.

He leaves a wife, formerly Miss Howe, three sons, two already mentioned residing in business at Montreal and a third Dr. Gilmor, practising at St. Martins, and one daughter, Mrs. Dick, of St. George.

The deceased was all his life engaged in farming and lumbering and will be remembered not only on account of his long political service, but as a most kindly hospitable gentleman. He was a Liberal, a free trader and a Baptist.

DANCE AT THE MESS.

A ROYAL HOSTLER.

Prince Alexander of Teck Hard to Work.

New York, April 14.—The Sun today has the following special:

London, April 11.—Secretary of War Brodrick's army reforms have produced many strange results. The latest is that when the Prince of Wales visited Prince Alexander of Teck, at Hampton Court barracks, he found him in the stables stripped to his shirt, busily feeding and grooming horses alongside the troopers. Inquiries elicited the fact that Prince Alexander belonged to a regiment which consisted at the time of seven men and two officers. It is a composite regiment of recruits to the 7th and 10th Hussars, which are both in South Africa. Drafts to these had reduced the composite regiment to nine men. They had to tend eighty-four horses, the War Office having refused permission for the employment of civil help.

This provisional regiment of hussars is included in Secretary Brodrick's first army corps.

Stream Drivers Make Trouble.

Police Sergeant Phillips had quite a lively time this morning getting a drunken stream driver to the lock up. He found the fellow on Carleton street and had scarcely more than got the twisters on him when two companions undertook to effect a rescue.
