THE CAROL SERVICE.

Great Musical Treat at the Methodist Church Last Evening.

The carol service at the Methodist Church last evening was successful beyond the most sanguine expectations of the promoters of the affair. The great edifice was crowded to its fullest capacity with an audience in which the music loving element of the community largely predominated, and it was quite evident that all thoroughly enjoyed the evening's entertainment. The program was a lengthy and varied one, and was carried out in a highly creditable manner. The selections by the choir were especially good and were listened to with much pleasure by the large audience.

The vocal soloists were Miss Palmer, Miss Gardiner and Prof. Saunders, and all acquitted themselves remarkably well. Miss Palmer, who was in splendid voice, rendered "The Resurrection" in a most charming manner, and if encores had been allowed she certainly would have come in for her share of them. Mr. Saunders sang "There is a Green Hill," in a most pleasing manner, and added materially to the high reputation he enjoys as an accomplished all round musician. Miss Gardiner was also heard with a great deal of pleasure by the audience.

The organ preludes by L. A. Wilmot Lemont the talented organist and choir master of the church were faultlessly rendered, and greatly enjoyed by the audience.

A violin solo by Miss Hazel Palmer with piano and organ accompaniment, was to many one of the most enjoyable features of the program. As a violinist Miss Palmer certainly displays remarkable skill, and her work cannot be too highly praised. Another pleasing feature of the program was an organ solo, charmingly rendered by Miss Edythe Crip, one of Marysville's most accomplished musicians. The intermezzo, in which Messrs. Cadwallader, Quirk, Lemont, Thomas, London, Burr, Saunders, and Miss Perkins took part, was well rendered, and lent variety to the program.

Among the selections by the choir was a carol entitled "Beyond the Starry Skies," composed by L. A. Wilmot Lemont.

The program concluded with the rendition by the choir of Gloria Patri from the 97th Psalm, followed by the National Anthem.

The greatest credit for the success of the entertainment is due to the untiring efforts put forth by L. A. Wilmot Lemont, organist and choir master of the church. Under his able leadership the Methodist choir has been brought to a very high state of efficiency, and as a musical organization is a credit to the city.

SUPREME COURT.

Only Two Common Motions Made at Opening of Easter Term.

Easter term of the supreme court opened at eleven o'clock this morning, with Judges Barker, Hanington, Gregory, Landry and McLeod, the chief justice being detained at home on account of illness. J. R. Murphy, barrister of Woodstock, presented his commission as one of His Majesty's council learned in the law, and was called within the bar.

The following common motions were made:

Ex parte John Leith—F. B. Carvell moves for a rule absolute for a certiorari and a rule nisi to quash a conviction made against defendant by John Farley, J. P., of Carleton County, for unlawfully taking lumber from certain lands. Rule absolute for a certiorari and rule nisi to quash, with stay of proceedings.

Ex parte J. Edward Armstrong—T. J. Carter, moves for a rule nisi for a mandamus to compel the C. P. R. to erect a sufficient and lawful fence along the line of railway, enclosed land improved land occupied by J. Edward Armstrong, in the parish of Perth, Victoria county. Withdrawn with leave to move tomorrow morning.

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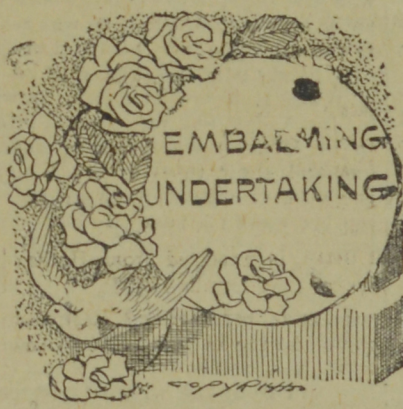
