THE RAILWAY QUESTION.

The Grand Trunk Pacific bill to incorporate the company, was discussed in the House of Commons Monday and passed its second reading.

The amendments proposed and the debate thereon were of special interest to people in this section of the province, but the conclusions reached do not by any means fix the matters dealt with. The government is going to build the line through New Brunswick and will have the selection of the route, which will only be fixed after surveys of the country have been made.

Those who advocate the St. John valley route have unanswerable arguments to advance, and we still hope that their view will prevail.

The effort of the Sun to make it appear that no provision is to be made for connection with that city was neutralized by the announcement of a member of the government that a line will be built or acquired from Chipman to St. John, and if the government will bring the road to Fredericton thence to Chipman and on to St. John the views of the people in this part of the province will be met. We do not take it that Mr. Emmerson's strong advocacy of carrying the road to Chipman conflicts with the claim that the line should pass through this city, and we trust that there is no intention of side-tracking Fredericton.

The Herald welcomes the Telegraph's advocacy of the river route, and will be glad to see other influences exerted in that direction.

THE NEW POPE.

The cardinals of the Roman Catholic church in solemn conclave at the Vatican to elect a new pope, have quite promptly attended to that responsible duty. Where there were so many aspirants and a two thirds vote was necessary to an election, it is surprising that a decision was reached so early.

Cardinal Sarto, who has been selected for the high office, is sixty-eight years old, ten years younger than Pope Leo was when he was elected to the Holy See. The new pontiff has a very creditable record as an earnest worker in the church and as a writer of some note.

WAITING FOR MR. BLAIR.

The Sun which a few weeks ago had no kind word for Mr. Blair but represented him as a gentleman of only ordinary force and ability, declares that the whole country is awaiting with breathless interest the ex-minister's speech on the government railway policy. Mr. Borden, the Tory leader, has spoken and "that was all right for the time and circumstances" says the Sun, but "Mr. Blair is the man whom the people are waiting to hear."

The Sun thus unwittingly pays Mr. Blair a great compliment, and confesses his great superiority over the Tory leader. With this the country will agree, but what a pity the Sun never discovered the New Brunswicker's great ability until Mr. Blair appeared in opposition to a government proposal. Even at this late day Mr. Blair may appreciate the Sun's penitence and confession, but how will Mr. Borden feel at being treated with thinly veiled disdain by his St. John organ.

The chairman of the new Canadian railway commission is to receive a salary of \$10,000 a year, the other two commissioners \$8,000 apiece, and the secretary \$4,000, but none of these snags are coming our way.

Lord Strathcona, who is returning to Canada to attend the meeting of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire at Montreal, may be sure of a very hearty welcome. Canada's grand old man has accomplished great things for this country at London, especially in aiding immigration. His voice is always raised and his purse is always open for anything likely to benefit his country.

The Montreal Gazette professes to have interviewed a New Brunswick Liberal who declares that the Conservatives will sweep this province in the next election. They must have a peculiar kind of stimulant to deal out to visiting New Brunswickers while visiting Montreal.

Col. Montizambert, connected with the Canadian militia since his youth and recently D. O. C. at Kingston, has been retired on a pension. He served in the Fenian raids of 1866 and 1870 and in the North West rebellion of 1885.

Hon. Mr. Macdonald, a Tory senator from British Columbia, has given notice of a resolution in the Senate, condemning the government's railway policy, and endorsing the resignation of Mr. Blair.

While Gamey was being lionized in Manitoulin, Hon. J. R. Stratton the man Gamey tried to ruin, received the plaudits of the electors at Sault St. Marie where a local bye election is pending.

Mr. E. D. Weldon, a prosperous business man of New York, familiarly known to his friends as "Tim Weldon" during his college days in Fredericton, is rusticated at Shediac with his family.

The Eastern Chronicle of New Glasgow, N. S., joins the Halifax Chronicle in urging that the portfolio of railways and canals be given to Hon. H. R. Emmerson.

Cardinal Sarto was apparently the dark horse in the race for the Holy See. His name was not prominently mentioned in connection with the position of pope.

Sir Sanford Fleming, the eminent engineer, approves of the government's policy and thinks it will accomplish great things for Canada.

The farmers of Manitoba have already commenced harvesting their wheat, which promises an abundant return.

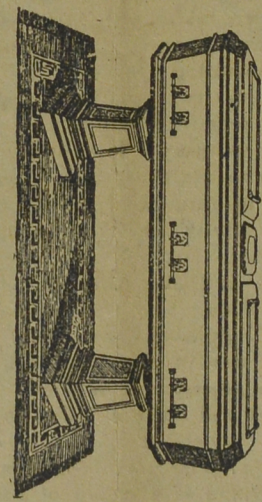
