Edgar Rainsford, the six year old son of Norman Thomas of Fredericton Junction, who was operated upon for appendicitis at the hospital on Saturday, died last evening. The remains have been prepared for burial by John G. Adams and will be taken to the Junction by the six o'clock train.

Peculiar Accident.

Capt. F. F. Henderson, who resides on the Estey farm at the lower end of the city, met with a painful and rather peculiar accident on Sunday. He was driving some stray cows from his field, and in running after them had the misfortune to trip and fall forward on his face. He brought up against a thorn bush and one of the sharp prongs penetrated his left eye, just grazing the eye ball. Dr. Vanwart was called and extracted the splinter, and anticipates no serious results to the optic. The accident will make it necessary for the captain to absent himself from the hay field for a few days.

Civic Matters.

The city council met in committee last evening and passed the usual monthly accounts. A letter from the Agricultural society, asking that the balance of the exhibition grant, amounting to \$1250, be paid as soon as convenient, was read and discussed. Some members of the board were of the opinion that the society should give a mortgage on the new building as security for the grant, and the Mayor and Ald. Clark were appointed a committee to confer with the society's executive on the subject. It is scarcely likely that any action will be taken in regard to the electric light matter at tonight's meeting.

A Splendid Steamer.

played by both officers and crew on that occasion. Mr. Reed-Lewis has been an extensive traveller, having crossed the Atlantic twenty-five times, but never remembers having seen greater coolness shown in the face of an emergency than was exhibited by the Calvin Austin captain after the collision.

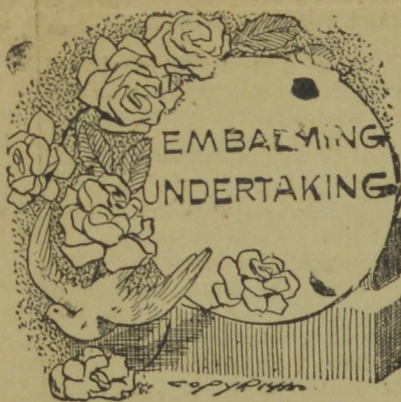
