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TROUBLE IN THE WIGWAM.

Winnipeg Orangemen Angry with Mr. E. F. Clarke, M. P.

HE VISITED THE ARCH- BISHOP'S PALACE,

And Grand Master Sproule was Greatly Disturbed.

LEFT THE CONSERVATIVE LEADERS AND CAME HOME.

Lodge Fifteen Twenty Wants to Know.

(Special Correspondence to the Toronto Globe.)

Winnipeg, March 7.—It has transpired that whatever were the results of the tour of Mr. R. L. Borden and party to the coast last fall, it at least was neither conducive to nor productive of harmony among the inmates of his private car. It will be remembered that Dr. Sproule, Supreme Grand Master of the Orange Order, was a member of the party, and from his services to the Conservatives and his long parliamentary record it might have been reasonably expected that he would take a prominent part in proceedings and meetings connected with the tour. This was not the case, however, and he was forced into the background, and was not permitted to speak at any important centre in the west, excepting the Orange stronghold at Vancouver, where his followers insisted upon it. This treatment of Dr. Sproule aroused considerable interest, and his silence lacked interpretation, especially in view of the fact that Mr. E. F. Clark, M. P., editor of The Orange Sentinel, took a very prominent part.

It aroused the antagonism of a certain percentage of the Orangemen, who regarded it as a slight upon the order, and who were sufficiently astute to read between the lines correctly, that it was part of Mr. Borden's policy to sacrifice Dr. Sproule in the hope of securing the friendship and support of the hierarchy. In order to carry out this policy the doctor was mollified, but was hauled around from place to place as a peace-offering and a drawing card for the Orangemen, in the mistaken idea that his appearance among them and Mr. Clarke's appearance on the platform would be sufficient.

Unfortunately for Mr. Borden's plans, the Orangemen of the west place but small reliance in Mr. Clarke, while in Dr. Sproule they have the most implicit confidence. The former is known to be acceptable to the hierarchy of the east and west, whereas the latter is not. Indeed, in discussing Cabinet possibilities, should the Conservatives be returned at next election, at a western point, trouble was caused by the suggestion of Dr. Sproule as a man entitled to a portfolio. Quebec representatives denounced him immediately, but offered to accept Mr. Clarke as a compromise.

TROUBLE AT WINNIPEG.

These matters became known to Winnipeg Orangemen, and when Mr. Borden's party arrived in that city they made a move in the matter. Things were then at a critical point in the interior of the car. Dr. Sproule had become restive under his treatment and was tired of being hauled around merely as an advertisement. His friends there asked that he be accorded the privilege of speaking

during the stay of the party in the city, but the suggestion was evaded. He then consulted prominent Orangemen as to what course he should follow, as he had practically decided to leave Mr. Borden's party and return home. Hot words passed between him and his leader, and he was anxious to quit them, but was persuaded to remain. Thus was one crisis avoided.

But on the morning following the banquet the party, including Mr. E. F. Clarke proceeded to St. Boniface to pay respects to his Grace Archbishop Langevin. Dr. Sproule refused to go, and in his refusal he was endorsed by leading Orangemen. However, the rest of the party visited Mr. Langevin's palace, where they were cordially received by Vicar Dugas in the absence of the Archbishop. He welcomed them to the town and placed on record how glad he was to be able to greet "his friends." They then visited the Catholic schools and the College of St. Boniface, making a general exchange of courtesies between the hierarchy and themselves. Dr. Sproule at once left the party and came home.

A FORMAL PROTEST.

This action of Mr. Clarke aroused the Orangemen, who were already in no pleasant mood, and at the December meeting of L. O. L. 1,520, Winnipeg, the Worshipful Master in his address took occasion to roundly score Mr. Clarke for consorting with the opponents of the order and being classed as a "friend" of its enemies. The same address applauded the action of Dr. Sproule.

In the course of the meeting a resolution was offered asking Mr. Clarke why he had gone to visit the Archbishop, and why he had also gone out of his way to visit Roman Catholic institutions, to the neglect of Protestant ones. It was highly suggestive of the impropriety of his course, but was merely asking for his explanation.

It was sent to him, together with the Worshipful Master's address, the latter for publication, according to custom, in The Sentinel. Mr. Clarke carefully blue-pencilled the reference to himself and his visit to the palace, as a reference to his paper will show, and thus was guilty of mutilating it. He is reported to have also transmitted a very warm reply to 1,520, one not in keeping with his duties and obligations as an Orangeman. He did not answer, nor essay to answer, the questions of the resolution, but intimated that he would go where he liked, when he liked, and as often as he liked, and it was none of their business.

CONTRASTED WITH THE GRAND MASTER.

The lodge, upon receiving this reply, drafted a strong resolution denouncing his inconsistency, and comparing his course with that of Dr. Sproule, much to the latter's benefit. These were transmitted to the Sentinel for publication, together with a request for the publication of the full text of the Master's address, but up to date they have been suppressed. However, the position taken by Winnipeg Orangemen would indicate that the matter is far from settled and that Mr. Clarke placed an immovable obstacle between himself and the western members of the order of which he is supposed to be the mouthpiece. A serious division and internal dissension is imminent in the higher councils of Mr. Borden's unhappy family. The occupants of the "nest of traitors" are probably not all removed yet. Dr. Sproule will not be sacrificed to Mr. Clarke's ambitions and in deference to the hierarchy without a vigorous struggle on the part of the order of which he is the head.

Balfour on the Bible.

London, March 9.—Mr. Balfour was the central figure at the inaugural meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society Centenary celebration. He was the principal speaker and delivered an intensely interesting address, upon which all the leading papers comment this morning.

The Lord Mayor of London, a Jew, preided, and among other speakers were the Marquis of Northampton, an Anglican; Mr. Perks, M. P., a Methodist. Lord Northampton said that a hundred years ago there were less than fifty translations of the Bible, while now the whole Bible is translated into a hundred languages, and parts of it into three hundred and thirty others. The society, he said, had brought out a hundred and eighty million copies during its century of existence.

Mr. Balfour said these facts caused a thrill of pride, mingled with astonishment, in the breasts of all who heard them stated. Putting religion aside, what a benefit to philology and the allied science was implied in such a statement; but religion, not philology, was what brought them together, and religion was the real motive force which must be behind any appeal to their fellow countrymen. Mr. Balfour dealt at some length with the objections to the higher criticism. He praised the society's work, and said its self-imposed duty was to spread the gospel to all the world. It was announced at all the meetings yesterday that the King and Prince of Wales are patrons of the society and liberal donors.
