

"PLAIN AND SIMPLE" COMMENT.

Mr. Rickard, Ontario Liberal Member,

PUT GAMEY CASE VERY FORCIBLY

And Moved a Vote of Censure on the Conspirator.

Toronto, June 24.—By way of change, the floor of the legislature was in possession of the Liberals during nearly all of yesterday's session, the opposition manifesting a keen desire to have the question put. Mr. St. John concluded his address in an hour in the forenoon, and moved an amendment expressing the view that the report was not in accordance with the evidence. He was followed by Mr. William Rickard of West Durham, whose breezy style and host of arguments made quite an impression on the House. He concluded by moving an amendment to the amendment, adding to the main motion an expression of censure on Mr. Gamey for his conduct in connection with the case.

Mr. Rickard represented himself as "a plain and simple man," not a lawyer, and not gifted with the powers of endless talk. But a plain and simple man knows what to call one who deliberately signs another's name to a document and passes it off as his own. He also knows what name to apply to a man who exchanges bank deposit slips, and carries off the property of a bank and then denies that he has done so. I have an idea, he said, I could find a name to describe one Mr. Gamey, who did some slight-of-hand work with those bank deposit slips. Plain and simple people would use names about that man which may not be Parliamentary. And I wonder if that Mr. Gamey is the same gentleman as the member for Manitoulin, who yesterday received a bunch of pennies with the inscription, "To one who would rather be than seem to be an honest man?" In his speech the other day the member for Manitoulin declared that the Chancellor of this Province, Sir John Boyd, should remove the star of Knighthood from his breast for having written the report of the Royal Commission. I could tell the hon. member that men who sign other people's names and tamper with other people's property and steal bank documents are not decorated with stars as Sir John Boyd was by his Sovereign, but wear "stripes" supplied by the government; that such men are not allowed to change those stripes at their will; that they are surrounded by four stone walls of facts, and that a watchman with a Winchester keeps guard over them by day and by night.

Mr. Rickard reverted to the deposit slip subject, saying that when a man carried away, destroyed or concealed the property of another the public called it stealing. Those bank slips were regarded by the banks as valuable vouchers.

Mr. Rickard devoted some time to a consideration of Mr. Gamey's letter on September 10 and that of October 27, which he had said were similar. Mr. Rickard pointed out the numerous instances of material changes in the latter letter. The hon. gentleman said that because a man's son was in the employ of the government he was not to be believed on oath. The only thing that they heard about the hon. member for Manitoulin's son was that he had signed a letter in his father's name to the premier. This was a splendid example.

A Novel Suicide.

New York, June 24.—Archibald Morrison, a salesman, committed suicide today in a novel way from the Brooklyn Bridge. He climbed the platform railway south of the Brooklyn tower, jumped on to a train bound for Brooklyn, fell off the last car struck the third rail, was flung across the track, fell through the ties and landed on Front street, more than 100 feet below,

a mangled corpse. Morrison was not seen by anyone before he landed on top of the car. A passenger on the rear platform of the last car of the train saw him jump and yelled. This brought everybody in the car to their feet, and all was excitement. As Morrison jumped part of the car ran under a bar crossing the trestle-work, and he was hit by it. It swept him off the car, landing him on the third rail. He was probably dead before he landed in the street.

Drowned at Levis.

Quebec, June 25.—A sad drowning accident occurred at Levis wharf last evening just on the departure of the boat for Quebec, when a young lady, Miss Lizzie Birn of this city, lost her life. The victim and her sister, accompanied by Mr. Rankin, arrived down at the wharf just as the steamer left her moorings. One of the ladies succeeded in jumping on board the steamer, but her sister, in attempting to jump on the boat, which was then about four feet from the wharf, miscalculated the distance and fell into the river. As the accident was noticed by the crew, the boat was immediately stopped and put back, while life preservers were thrown into the river. Mr. Rankin made an attempt to jump into the river to rescue the young lady, but was caught by the men in charge of the pontoon, who were aware of the danger at that point, owing to the strong current. The unfortunate victim was never seen after she had fallen into the river.

THAT LIBEL SUIT

Mr. Milligan Gives Further Evidence in the Case.

POSITIVELY SWEARS THAT HE KNEW NOTHING

Of the Rothesay Electoral List Forgery.

THE DEFENCE OPENED.

On the opening of the St. John circuit court Thursday morning, libel suit of Milligan vs. Crocket was resumed.

Mr. McKeown drew attention to the report in the St. John Daily Sun today. He said it appeared to him that it was a most unfair report. The case was alluded to as "the notorious Milligan-Crocket libel suit." This in itself was an unfair statement, and he thought such reports should not be published.

His Honor told the press that he did not wish them to make any comments on the case; all they were entitled to do was to publish a fair report of the proceedings.

Mr. Milligan resumed the giving of evidence. He said that in January, 1901, he first knew he was being mixed up by report with the bogus Rothesay list. He made inquiries in his office about the letter which Postmaster Hanington had said was registered in his name, and could find out nothing about it. Mr. John S. Burpee, a clerk in the office, had charge of the mailing of letters, the witness himself had nothing to do with that. In reference to the libellous letter that appeared in the Gleaner, the part that mentioned the deaf and dumb, witness said he had no particular reason to be friendly to the deaf and dumb. The Gleaner took the side of the officials of the institution in the deaf and dumb inquiry, and was bitterly opposed to the stand the Telegraph took. This was the reason for the letter appearing in the Gleaner. In consequence of this letter, the directors of the Telegraph Publishing Company requested an explanation from the witness whether he was guilty of the crime charged or not. Witness made a public denial of the charge in an open letter. Mr. Milligan read this letter. Witness said he never had anything to do with the preparation of an electoral list for the parish of Rothesay or the county of Kings in the year 1900. He had never seen the bogus lists and has not seen them yet.

Cross-examined by Mr. O. S. Crocket, witness said that at first he did not think the Rothesay affair was a very serious one. Later, when he learned more about it, he came to the conclusion that a very serious crime had been committed. He knew the Rothesay affair had been before the Supreme Court, had read the judgment of the judges, and thought the judgment describing the crime as involving perjury, forgery and theft, was ridiculous. He could not conceive a set of circumstances when all these crimes could be involved. He had never seen the original forged lists; he had seen the lists that appeared in the Gleaner. He thought there were conservative names on the list as well as Liberal. Named one: Mr. Wilfrid Campbell. As a politician he did not think the persons whose names were added could vote. There was a bye-election in Kings in September, 1900. Witness was at Rothesay. He saw a statement in the press that he had attempted to personate the Rev. Allan Daniel. He had denied this in the press.

Here Judge McLeod stated that he would allow the witness to take his own course in answering any further questions on this line.

Witness then stated that the statement as to his personating Mr. Daniel was a lie. Asked to describe the libel, he

consisted of, witness said he did not remember. He was asked if his denial did not consist of a statement that he did the thing for a joke. This question being objected to, was ruled out, and witness was not compelled to answer it. In reference to the letter which he published denying any connection with the preparation of the Rothesay lists, he stated that the Conservative papers did not dare to accuse him openly, and as he was used to slander from them, he paid no attention to their insinuations as far as he himself was concerned. As he stated in the letter, for himself he did not care, but the interest of the Liberal party demanded that he should make a denial. He had dared the Sun to charge him openly, and that paper did not do so, as the publishers knew he would bring an action for libel. As soon as the letter appeared in the Gleaner containing definite charges, he took action.

The court here adjourned.
