THE EXHIBITION ACCOUNTS.

It is very gratifying to the management of the Fredericton exhibition held last September, as it is to the general public, that the show paid its way so completely. The accounts have all been adjusted, all bills have been paid and there is a small surplus in the hands of the treasurer. The exhibition itself showed the handsome surplus of \$2,109.57.

The society, however, found it necessary to add very largely to their facilities for handling the exhibition, having expended in new buildings, purchase of land, installation of electric light plant and other improvements, the large sum of \$9,082.11 and against this they had the city and government grants and a balance from former years amounting in the whole to \$7,000. The society's assets including the buildings, grounds, electric light plant, etc., represent the handsome sum of \$17,372.76, entirely clear of debt, so that they are in a splendid financial position to handle the next exhibition and make a profit under as favorable conditions as met them last September.

This excellent showing redounds greatly to the credit of the society and its energy in officials, and firmly establishes their reputation for being able to handle an exhibition proposition with great business sagacity and success.

AN UNFOUNDED CHARGE.

A Tory newspaper, either through ignorance or maliciousness, declares that Mr. Blair took no part in the federal election of 1890, but was ready enough to accept a seat in the Laurier cabinet after the Liberals had won a victory.

The charge does Mr. Blair an injustice. If the newspaper in question will take the trouble to search its own files, it will discover that Mr. Blair took a very active part in the Liberal campaign of 1896, delivering able speeches at various centres. More than this, Mr. Blair took a full hand in every federal campaign from the time he entered public life in 1878, down to the last one when he so emphatically defeated Mr. Foster in St. John, and carried a majority of the seats in this province for the Liberals.

The charge that Mr. Blair was only an active Liberal after his party had won the triumph of 1896 at the polls, is as false as many others that have been persistently urged against that gentleman during his long, successful and honorable public career.

A BISHOP'S RESIGNATION.

News of the resignation of His Lordship Bishop Courtenay of Nova Scotia, will be received with genuine surprise and regret. He leaves that diocese in April next to accept the rectory of St. James church, New York City, after sixteen years occupation of the bishopric of the neighboring province. Bishop Courtenay, has been a frequent visitor to this city, as a participant in the Cathedral services, and his able sermons attracted many from outside his own communion. On one occasion also he was the alumni orator at the University convocation.

His Lordship is a native of England, 66 years old, and before becoming bishop of Nova Scotia, held pastorates in New York, Chicago and Boston. He is a gentleman of prepossessing appearance, a broad minded, eloquent and attractive preacher, and his removal from Halifax will be greatly regretted, and will be a distinct loss to the Anglican church in Canada.

Mr. Grover Cleveland declares in a letter to the Brooklyn Eagle that never again will he be a candidate for the presidency of the United States.

UNDESERVED REFLECTIONS.

The St. John Star referring to the approaching visit of Mr. Borden to that city says: "And all parties will greet him as the man who has lifted parliamentary tactics from the level of petty trickery; whose course in everything has been honorable and clean; who in the hottest debate has never forgotten to be courteous and fair; who, in short, has shown Canadians that a politician may be a gentleman in the full sense of the word: [This is all very nice, and perhaps is true in a measure, but isn't it a little tough on former Tory leaders, the late Sir John Macdonald, Sir John Thompson, Sir Mackenzie Bowell and Sir Chas. Tupper? Are we to understand from the Star that these gentlemen descended to petty trickery?]

The Conservatives of Kings, N. S., have as a firm hope put up a Dr. Miller of Canning, against Sir Frederick Borden in that constituency. The minister of militia has always had opposition, but only on one occasion was he defeated when in 1882 the late D. B. Woodworth came out of the west with a barrel of money which he used successfully in Kings. With the exception of the term from 1882 to 1887, Sir Frederick has represented Kings since 1874—a period of twenty-five years.

Mr. Borden, the Tory leader, does not include Fredericton in his maritime province tour. He has probably given this constituency up. Two years ago he spoke for the Tory candidate in the federal bye election and Mr. Gibson's majority which was considerably under 100 the previous year, went up to 730. That little fact would discourage almost any political leader, and it has left its mark on Mr. Borden.

The Douglas councillor who moved a resolution against paying smallpox bills, is up against the troublesome and expensive disease again. Last night under his nose at Nashwaakie, and the councillor was very prompt in calling in the assistance of the health officers. No doubt the councillor will be willing at the next meeting of the County Council to pay the accounts for the present outbreak of the disease.

Seven ocean steamers are now in St. John harbor for winter port business, and in the past two days, besides a big lot of freight, 800 passengers have been landed there. Surely we shall hear no more grumbling from St. John on the winter port business, when there is every prospect that this season's trade will far outstrip all past records.

The Brantford Exporter has made a canvass which shows that the manufacturing industries of that city employed 1,439 hands in 1896 and 3,810 in 1903. Evidently the tariff as revised and administered by the Liberal has proved very beneficial to the manufacturers of Brantford.

At a Liberal gathering in Montreal the other night, Mr. Monet, a Liberal M. P., referred to the claim that Mr. Tarte would take seventeen constituencies from the Liberal party in Quebec, which he scouted, and declared that the real question was, could Mr. Tarte get elected himself?

Col. H. T. Laurence, a gentleman well known in Fredericton military circles, is a candidate for the mayoralty of Truro. He is a brother of Hon. F. A. Laurence, speaker of the Nova Scotia House of Assembly.

There is every prospect that the Dreyfus case will be reopened and the friends of the famous Frenchman who has suffered so much, are confident that a new trial will result in his rehabilitation.
